UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS IN WALES

1. We have had two recent letters from Mr Nicholas Edwards MP, the Member for Pembroke, about local enquiries he has received on the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects. We have also had a number of letters direct from members of the public in Wales (although not from residents of Pembroke) and in addition there have been one or two quite lurid press reports. I attach copies of the relevant correspondence.

2. We have not invoked the assistance of P & SS before on UFOs and as I explained on the telephone the last thing I want to do is to involve you in extraneous problems which would divert you from your more immediate work on low flying complaints. The standard procedure on UFOs is to send the reports to the various specialist authorities in MOD to make sure they contain no items of defence interest but to leave it there. We have followed the usual procedure in this case and nothing has come to light to suggest anything untoward in Wales and in the normal way we would have left it at that. I confess, however, that I find the correspondence a little puzzling. According to the press cuttings some of the "witnesses" are people who might be expected to be fairly level headed and Mr Edwards does say in his letter of 24th May that he has been inundated with enquiries (I should add however that the Section 40 quote is known to be associated with a local UFO society and so may have a vested interest).

3. I should be grateful if you would have a look at these papers and let me know whether you think some sort of discreet enquiry would be worthwhile and if so whether your staff could find time for it in view of your other pressing obligations. What I would really like to know is the volume of local interest and/or alarm and whether there is a readily discernible rational explanation for it (perhaps a practical joker) or even whether there is prima facie evidence for a more serious specialist enquiry. But I have not committed you in anyway and I have not even told the Minister I am consulting you. If you think a P & SS initiative is likely to be unfruitful I will drop the idea. Would you please let me know what you think.

If you do decide to go ahead it would be helpful to have a short initial discussion.

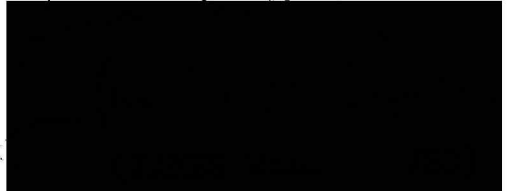

The CRO has visited [redacted] but he tells us that he can offer no explanation for the phenomenon she believes she saw in April. She spoke I understand of an object the size of a mini bus which descended into the field and from which emerged two humanoid figures. They had gone when she returned with help. The CRO inspected the field but there was no trace of any unusual visitation. There is a fair amount of activity in the general area from the Royal Aircraft Establishment and also from civil aircraft although neither of these is a likely explanation. The CRO added that there is some general speculation in the neighbourhood that a practical joker may be at work. RAF Brawdy have had other enquiries about men in silver suits and it is perhaps not irrelevant that a local factory manufactures protective clothing of this type for the oil installation at Milford Haven. One of these "silver suits" is also on display in a shop at Brawdy village. I understand incidentally that RAF fire fighting suits (the nearest Service equivalent) are blue and that there is no possibility Brawdy personnel are involved. ROC uniforms are also blue.

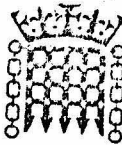

Following our recent communication I have visited Mrs [REDACTED] at the [REDACTED], Haverfordwest. [REDACTED] who is of French/Spanish extraction and in her early 50's told me that one night in April of this year she saw a round object 'like the moon falling down' land in a field at the back of her property. Two very tall, faceless 'humanoids' got out of this object (about the size of a mini bus) and appeared to 'take measurements or gather things'. When [REDACTED] returned after calling members of the family the objects had vanished.

I examined the suggested landing site, which is in a field adjacent to a Royal Observer Corp underground monitoring post (MOD Post Shelter?) but could find no evidence of a landing. I can offer no explanation of [REDACTED] sighting but can confirm that it is not connected with the operations of RAF Brawdy.

There have been numerous sightings of UFO's in what the popular press now call 'the Broad Haven Triangle'. A high level of flying activity is generated by the military and civil airfields and to a lesser extent the Royal Aircraft Establishments; the area is also overflown by trans-atlantic aircraft. It has also been suggested that a local prankster is at work. The majority of sightings are reported to a Mr [REDACTED] of Roch who is the 'regional investigating co-ordinator' for the British UFO Research Association.

I'm unable to offer any explanation other than above but should a UFO arrive at RAF Brawdy we will charge normal landing fees and inform you immediately!

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS IN WALES

1. We have had two recent letters from Mr Nicholas Edwards MP, the Member for Pembroke, about local enquiries he has received on the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects. We have also had a number of letters direct from members of the public in Wales (although not from residents of Pembroke) and in addition there have been one or two quite lurid press reports. I attach copies of the relevant correspondence.

2. We have not invoked the assistance of P & SS before on UFOs and as I explained on the telephone the last thing I want to do is to involve you in extraneous problems which would divert you from your more immediate work on low flying complaints. The standard procedure on UFOs is to send the reports to the various specialist authorities in MOD to make sure they contain no items of defence interest but to leave it there. We have followed the usual procedure in this case and nothing has come to light to suggest anything untoward in Wales and in the normal way we would have left it at that. I confess, however, that I find the correspondence a little puzzling. According to the press cuttings some of the "witnesses" are people who might be expected to be fairly level headed and Mr Edwards does say in his letter of 24th May that he has been inundated with enquiries (I should add however that the [redacted] he quotes is known to be associated with a local UFO society and so may have a vested interest).

3. I should be grateful if you would have a look at these papers and let me know whether you think some sort of discreet enquiry would be worthwhile and if so whether your staff could find time for it in view of your other pressing obligations. What I would really like to know is the volume of local interest and/or alarm and whether there is a readily discernible rational explanation for it (perhaps a practical joker) or even whether there is prima facie evidence for a more serious specialist enquiry. But I have not committed you in anyway and I have not even told the Minister I am consulting you. If you think a P & SS initiative is likely to be unfruitful I will drop the idea. Would you please let me know what you think.

If you do decide to go ahead it would be helpful to have a short "limited" discussion.

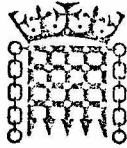

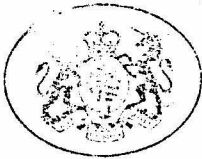

The CRO has visited [redacted] but he tells us that he can offer no explanation for the phenomenon she believes she saw in April. She spoke I understand of an object the size of a mini bus which descended into the field and from which emerged two humanoid figures. They had gone when she returned with help. The CRO inspected the field but there was no trace of any unusual visitation. There is a fair amount of activity in the general area from the Royal Aircraft Establishment and also from civil aircraft although neither of these is a likely explanation. The CRO added that there is some general speculation in the neighbourhood that a practical joker may be at work. RAF Brawdy have had other enquiries about men in silver suits and it is perhaps not irrelevant that a local factory manufactures protective clothing of this type for the oil installation at Milford Haven. One of these "silver suits" is also on display in a shop at Brawdy village. I understand incidentally that RAF fire fighting suits (the nearest Service equivalent) are blue and that there is no possibility Brawdy personnel are involved. ROC uniforms are also blue.

Following our recent communication I have visited [redacted] at the [redacted], Haverfordwest. [redacted] who is of French/Spanish extraction and in her early 50's told me that one night in April of this year she saw a round object 'like the moon falling down' land in a field at the back of her property. Two very tall, faceless 'humanoids' got out of this object (about the size of a mini bus) and appeared to 'take measurements or gather things'. When [redacted] returned after calling members of the family the objects had vanished.

I examined the suggested landing site, which is in a field adjacent to a Royal Observer Corp underground monitoring post (MOD Post Shelter?) but could find no evidence of a landing. Thank you for your letter of 8 January 2004.

I apologise for not including copies of the notes of the HQ Provost and Security Services (HQ P&SS) investigation into the sonic event near Sheffield on 24 March 1997, with my letter of 23 December 2003. These are now attached for your information.

With regard to your questions about whether HQ P&SS made enquiries with RAF Fylingdales about these events, it may be useful if I explain that HQ P&SS investigate reported sonic events to establish whether they could have been caused by military aircraft activity. Once it is established that there is no military link (as in this case), they do not pursue their enquiries to the point of positively identifying the cause. I can, therefore, confirm that they did not make any enquiries with RAF Fylingdales. During the investigation, the British Geological Survey stated that satellite or meteor re-entry have been known to cause sonic events and this comment was included in the HQ P&SS report.

In order to assist with your enquiries, I asked RAF Fylingdales to check their records for any details of satellite re-entries between 2150Z and 2230Z on 24 March 1997 and the following is the information they have provided. Please note that RAF Fylingdales track satellites and space debris and do not hold information on meteors, comets, etc.

“RAF Fylingdales have accurate information for all large object (> than 1 sq m) re-entries, but have none for the day in question (or several days before or after).

Data on small object re-entries are not so accurate. We are provided with a decay date (but no time) for these events, and the accuracy of these dates cannot be given high credence (most are OK +/- 1 day).

Between 23-25 March 1997 we have details of two small object re-entries:

Object 24010 (94029BF) and 24497 (94029 UW)

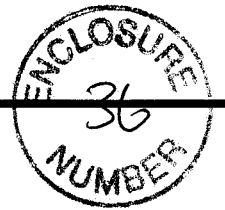

Thank you for your letter of 23 December 2003 responding to my requests under the Code of Practice for copies of MOD files relating to UFOs.

I intend to make an initial request for copies of specific files in the near future.

In the meantime I write to point out that in your letter you refer to the release of the RAF police investigation notes on the 24 March 1997 sonic event near Sheffield and write that "these [notes] have now been retrieved and copies are enclosed." However, there were no copies of any notes relating to this case attached to your letter, I presume as a result of an oversight. Please could you re-send these.

Further to this matter, I note that the letter from HQ Provost & Security Services dated May 1998 refers to "...sonic events can not be identified as being specifically caused by aircraft... other phenomena such as satellite or meteor re-entry have been known to cause sonic events and this may explain the happenings of 24 Mar 97."

I understand from one of your earlier letters (25 July 2001) that RAF Fylingdales has responsibility for reporting and tracking satellite and meteor re-entries and can be called upon by MOD to correlate these with sightings or reports of unusual phenomena.

Thank you for your letter of 26 November concerning MOD files relating to 'unidentified flying objects' and your comments regarding public access to those files. It may assist you if I explain the MOD's position with regard to the records we hold and the release of those records in light of Open Government Initiatives.

Government records which are not yet 30 years old, whether held in the National Archive or in MOD archives and offices, are not generally open for public inspection and access to information contained in them is granted at the discretion of the department to which the records belong. The Open Government Initiatives, including the White Paper on Open Government published in July 1993 and the Code of Practice on Access to Government Information (the Code), do not affect departmental discretion. In accordance with the Code, information will be released on request, providing it is not subject to Code exemptions, the provisions of the Data Protection Act, or any other relevant Act of Parliament. The Code will be superseded by the Freedom of Information Act 2000 on 1 January 2005.

With regard to the granting of special access to selected individuals, this is inconsistent with the spirit of open government. Access to original documents is, therefore, only approved if the individual is involved in research which is commissioned, sponsored or approved by the MOD or is seen to be research from which HM Government or MOD will derive benefit. As you will be aware, the MOD has only a limited interest in 'UFO' matters and while it is entirely a matter for you to decide the course of your research, we do not believe that your studies would provide significant benefit to the MOD. That is not to say that we do not appreciate that there is a public interest in this material and for that reason we have included classes of information on 'UFO's' in the MOD's Freedom of Information Publication Scheme. It is also our intention to place additional classes in the Scheme and we are currently examining our files in order to make any release as comprehensive and logical as possible.

Turning now to your requests for an estimate of the cost of processing the files detailed in your letter, in accordance with the Code. Please see the attached table. As requested, I have provided a separate estimate for each of the numbered files/sets of files wherever possible. The estimate is based on the number of pages requiring examination on each individual file and the cost of each set is given in full. If you were to request these documents in batches, the first four hours of the first batch would be free of charge, thereby reducing that batch by £60. With regard to file set number 7 (shown as 6 in your letter), (D/DI55/108/15 Parts 4-7), these files are currently held in an archive which is subject to asbestos contamination and we do not have access to them at this time. It is impossible, therefore, to provide an estimate of the cost of processing. Also, the file at number 10 (9 in your letter)(DRP(RAF)326/2 Pt A) contains 282 pages, only 14 of which concern UFO matters. It appears that 'UFO' may have been added to the title of the file to highlight the fact that there are UFO papers on the file rather than that the whole file is about UFOs. To process the whole file would cost considerably more than just to process the UFO papers, so I have included both estimates for your information.

You also enquired about the RAF Police Investigator's notes requested in your previous letter dated 14 June, which the RAF Police were experiencing difficulties in retrieving. I apologise for the delay. These have now been retrieved and copies are enclosed. The final report may differ slightly from the copy sent with our earlier letter which we suspect was an earlier draft. While disclosing these papers the RAF Police have asked me to explain to you that civil police investigations are subject to "public interest immunity" which protects the freedom of communication between the Police and the Crown Prosecution Service. The military police have a similar system and this means that Service police reports are normally only disclosed to an accused's Commanding Officer and a limited number of Service legal personnel. Having examined these papers, however, the RAF Police have concluded that as there is no suspect, no interview transcript or written statements, they will make an exception on this occasion and disclose the papers to you.

Finally, you asked for clarification regarding information for which individuals are charged. The Code states that Departments, Agencies and public bodies should make their own arrangements for charging for information to take account of the additional costs to the Department of searching for the requested information, and processing it for release. The MOD deems it reasonable to conduct four hours work free of charge and after this time to make a charge of £15 per extra hour (or part thereof) worked. The Publication Scheme is part of the forthcoming Freedom of Information Act and is a means of informing the public what information is readily available and how they may gain access to it. Once information has been released into the public domain it therefore makes sense to add it to the Publication Scheme, something which is actively encouraged by the Information Commissioner. I do, however, understand your concerns regarding information for which individuals have paid a charge, and I have raised this issue with the Directorate who have the policy lead on both the Code and the Freedom of Information Act. I will write to you again in the new year about this matter. In the meantime, you may wish to take into account the fact that we are conducting a review of our files and do plan to release as much information as possible into the Publication Scheme in due course. Also, as you are probably aware, while this Department is the focal point within the MOD for UFO correspondence, at least two other branches have been involved in this subject and by examining all the available files, at the same time, we will aim to make the classes of information as comprehensive as possible. This is something that might not be achieved by looking at individual files in isolation.

I hope this is helpful.

DISCLOSURE OF DFCIT REPORT ON ALLEGED SONIC EVENT

Reference:

A. E-mail from DAS-Sec 3, transmitted 1 Dec 03.

1. At Reference A, you asked if DFCIT would release a copy of the DFCIT file papers to Dr Clarke, covering the investigation into an alleged sonic boom occurring in the Peak District near Sheffield on 24 Mar 97.
2. As you know we were experiencing difficulties in being able to retrieve information from Scanfile, and having found a floppy disc containing the final report, we forwarded an unsigned copy to you which, we understand was duly forwarded, in a suitably redacted manner, to Dr Clarke.
3. We have now retrieved the case file papers from Scanfile. Following advice from both the HQ P&SS, Data Protection Officer (DPO) and Legal Advisor (LA), DFCIT are content for you to release a copy to Dr Clarke. Two suitably redacted copies are attached, one for your retention. You will note that the covering report is slightly different to the one retrieved from the floppy disc. We suspect that the disc copy was the original draft.
4. For your background information, please be aware that in the civil system "public interest immunity" attaches to a report sent from the police to the CPS. The rationale behind such "public interest immunity" is that it is important for the proper functioning of the criminal process that there should be freedom of communication between the police and the CPS. Such a principle applies in the military investigative system as well. That is to say that public interest immunity should be considered to apply to service police reports and that they should only be disclosed to an accused's Commanding Officer, the Command Legal Cell, Higher Authority and the Royal Air Force Prosecuting Authority. No other service personnel or department should be supplied with a copy of the service police report.
5. Having considered the contents of the DFCIT file papers, both DPO and LA are of the view that to rely on "public interest immunity" defence would be difficult in that the DFCIT report does not appear to be a traditional police report. By this we mean there is no suspect as such and there is no interview transcript or written statements taken in accordance with S9 of the Criminal and Justice Act 1967.

ALLEGED SONIC EVENT - 24 MAR 97- SHEFFIELD, PEAK DISTRICT- FINAL REPORT

1. D/Sec(AS)/56/1 dated 25 Mar 98 tasked FCF with the investigation of an alleged sonic event which was reported to have happened on 24 Mar 97 in the Peak district near Sheffield.
2. Alfens Ops records revealed that there were no military fast jet aircraft booked into the night low flying area at the relevant times. Inquiries with all flying units failed to identify the ac concerned.
3. Mr [redacted], British Geological Survey (BGS), Edinburgh stated that on the 24 Mar 97 at 2152Z seismic monitors had recorded a signal consistent with a sonic event. A further signal consistent with a sonic event were recorded at 2206Z. These signals were monitored as coming from the area reported as the complaint location at the monitoring stations at Haverah Park (south west of Huddersfield) and Holmfirth (south west of Leeds). A low frequency microphone at Leeds University also recorded the sonic event. Mr [redacted] stated that although BGS can differentiate between sonic and seismic events, sonic events cannot be identified as being specifically caused by aircraft. Phenomena such as satellite or meteor re-entry have been known to cause sonic events and this may explain the happenings of 24 Mar 97.
4. AIS (Mil) at West Drayton were requested to provide a radar synopsis (Enclosure 1) and the radar tape for the 24 Mar 97 was still available. The tape was viewed between 242130ZMar97 and 242200ZMar97, using the Claxby and Great Dun Fell Radar Heads. The recording reveals that at 2139Z, a squawk of 2574/143 (Orcam/Karlshue), is in descent heading west. At 2145 ac squawk 2574/048 passes to the north by 2 nm of the plotted position and the aircraft lands at Manchester Airport at 2154Z. The Air Information Service Officer is of the opinion that this aircraft is too slow moving to have caused a sonic boom. No other aircraft were seen to be flying in the area.

It is therefore considered that no military link can be established to this reported event and the case is now considered closed.

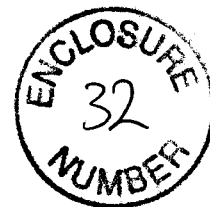

Thankyou for your letters of 28 July and 28 August in response to my requests for UFO-related information under the Code of Practice. Further to my request for a copy of the investigation file relating to the alleged sonic event near Sheffield on 24 March 1997, I note that you are in the process of retrieving the notes made by the RAF police. Has there been any progress in obtaining a copy of these notes?

RAF Police

I now turn to your letter of 28 July in response to my offer of assistance towards your on-going review of UFO records, and my request for access to MOD archives as part of my postgraduate research application. I do of course appreciate the logistical and security problems that would be entailed in involving non-MOD personnel access to sites where records are filed. I also appreciate the fact that many contain correspondence subject to the Data Protection Act and other sensitive information.

However, I do not accept these reasons are sufficient ones to deny access to public records – already earmarked for eventual release - by a qualified historian who is working on a research project accredited by a leading UK university. I would point out that many other academic projects deal with source material that is subject to Data Protection legislation and university researchers are as equally bound by that legislation as are MOD personnel.

Advice from A+B

I would also point out that the Department of Constitutional Affairs own guidance on handling requests under the Code of Practice states that *even when* exemptions under the Data Protection Act and national security apply “there is a presumption of disclosure unless the likely harm would outweigh the public interest in making the information available.”

Given the MOD’s public commitment to the release of UFO material and the impending FOIA I believe the Parliamentary Ombudsman may take a different view of this matter. I would therefore appreciate details of the procedure I should take should I wish to appeal.

In the meantime, I wish to thank you for the list of UFO-related records held by MOD from 1976-present. Having scrutinised this comprehensive list in some detail I note that only a limited number of files are directly of interest to my research proposal. If it were possible to obtain copies of these via one application under the Code of Practice it may not be necessary to make any further requests.

I have listed the files that are of specific interest below. I would appreciate it if you could supply a quote for processing them under the Code of Practice for Access to Government Information. It would be helpful if you could provide a separate estimate for each of the numbered file/set of files listed below:

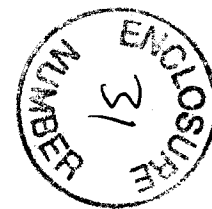

Public Access to Records less than 30 years old

9.1 Criteria for Access

9.2 Sponsored Access

9.1 Criteria for Access

9.1.1 Access to records which are not yet 30 years old, whether in the Public Record Office (PRO) or held by MOD, is granted at the discretion of the government department to which the records belong. The Open Government Initiatives, including the White Paper on Open Government published in July 1993 and the Code of Practice on Access to Government Information, do not affect departmental discretion. They do, however, seek to reduce the amount of material which is closed for longer than 30 years and make provision for more records to be released by:

- use of more exacting criteria to justify continued closure;
- re-review of previously withheld information;
- identification of material which is less than 30 years old but may be suitable for accelerated release;
- response to ad hoc requests.

9.1.2 In addition, information and, in certain circumstances, documents, can be made available in response to requests under the Code of Practice on Access to Government Information.

9.1.3 The guiding principle in these initiatives is to make as much as possible of the original record available to the public. On receipt of requests for access to material before it is 30 years old MOD is required to consider whether the material is suitable for early release. If it is the Lord Chancellor's approval must be sought. If it is not suitable for release, or resources are not available for the process of transfer to the PRO, MOD must consider whether granting access can be justified and defended as being in the public interest.

9.2 Sponsored Access

9.2.1 "Privileged access", meaning the granting of special access to selected individuals, is inconsistent with the spirit of open government. Access by individuals should therefore only normally be approved if the individual is involved in research which is commissioned, sponsored or approved by MOD or is seen to be research from which HMG or MOD will derive benefit, and can be justified as being in the public interest. Such "sponsored access" can be agreed at the discretion of the business unit holding the records concerned.

9.2.2 Such access should only be approved if the work involved in making the appropriate records available does not detract significantly from the ongoing work of the business unit.

9.2.3 In cases of doubt about the merit of allowing sponsored access, or for more detailed advice on

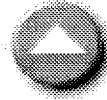

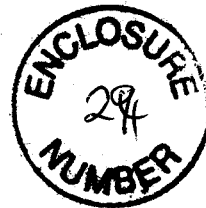

ALLEGED SONIC EVENT - 24 MAR 97- SHEFFIELD, PEAK DISTRICT- FINAL REPORT

1. D/Sec(AS)/56/1 dated 25 Mar 98 tasked FCF with the investigation of an alleged sonic event which was reported to have happened on 24 Mar 97 in the Peak district near Sheffield.
2. A search of TBC records from archives revealed that there was no military fast jet aircraft booked into the relevant night low flying area at the relevant times.
3. [REDACTED] of The British Geological Survey in Edinburgh stated that on the 24 Mar 97 at 2152Z his seismic monitors had recorded a signal consistent with a sonic event. A further signal consistent with a sonic event were recorded at 2206Z. These signals were monitored as coming from the area reported as the complaint location and monitoring stations at Haverah Park, south west of Huddersfield, Holmfirth, south west of Leeds and a low frequency microphone at Leeds University all recorded the sonic event. [REDACTED] stated that although BGS can differentiate between sonic and seismic events, sonic events can not be identified as being specifically caused by aircraft as other phenomena such as satellite or meteor re-entry have been known to cause sonic events and this may explain the happenings of 24 Mar 97.
4. AIS (Mil) at West Drayton were tasked with providing radar evidence and by pure coincidence the radar tape for the 24 Mar 97 was still in existence having already been impounded for another unconnected investigation. The tape was viewed between 242130ZMar97 and 242200ZMar97, using the Claxby and Great Dun Fell radar heads. The recording reveals that at 2139Z, a squawk of 2574/143(Orcam/Karlshue) in descent heading west. At 2145 : 09Z 2574/048 passes to the north by 2 nm of the plotted position and the aircraft lands at Manchester at 2154Z. The Air Information Service Officer is of the opinion that this aircraft appears to be too slow moving to cause a sonic boom and no other aircraft were seen to be flying in the area.

Thank you for your letter of 14 June concerning your request to assist with the review of UFO material and your further requests for information. I apologise for the delay in answering your letter, but I have tried to gather as much of the information you requested as possible before replying.

We understand your interest in the future release of UFO material and I can assure you that we are looking carefully at ways to make as much material as possible available to the public. However, there are practical difficulties with involving non-MOD staff in this process. For example, the files are not held at one location, but spread between The National Archive (previously the Public Record Office), the MOD Records department, several MOD Archives and in the case of more recent files, in more than one MOD office. I hope you will appreciate the logistical and security problems with allowing non-MOD personnel access to all of these sites.

Then there is the matter of the contents of the files themselves. Many contain correspondence and reports from people whose confidentiality we have a duty to protect under the Data Protection Act 1998. In addition, some may also contain sensitive information which the MOD may be required to withhold under an exemption of the Code. As well as the obvious security issues of allowing access to such information, we believe MOD staff are in the best position to judge such sensitivities.

With regard to your comments about the need to put released material into historical context, it may be helpful if I explain that under the Code of Practice on Access to Government Information (the Code) and the forthcoming Freedom of Information Act (FOI) 2000, the MOD is required to make requested information available wherever possible and, in the case of the FOI Act, to also operate a Publication Scheme to inform members of the public what information is published and how they can obtain access to it. We are not obliged to produce narratives, only to make information available so that individuals can conduct their own research.

We appreciate your offer of assistance, but given the above, we believe that we are able to conduct the review and release of future UFO information, and fulfil the requirements of the Code and the FOI Act without external assistance.

In your letter you also asked if we would be able to notify you in advance of any plans to release additional UFO material. It is not our practice to give any member of the public advanced notification before any other.

Turning to your four new requests for information, I will address these in the same order as your letter.

1. As requested, please find enclosed a list of UFO-related records held by MOD, 1976 to present, including the MOD file references, titles, date of contents and where appropriate The National Archive reference. Names of members of the public mentioned in the titles of some files have been excluded in accordance with the Data Protection Act 1998.
2. Our records show that in June 1977, following two letters from Mr Nicholas Edwards MP and several UFO sighting reports from members of the public in Wales, the RAF Police were asked to consider whether they thought it would be worthwhile for them to conduct enquiries in order to gauge local interest and to see if there was a rational explanation for these reports. There is no record on our files as to whether the RAF Police made any such enquiries and the RAF Police do not retain records of correspondence for more than 7 years. I am therefore unable to supply the information you have requested here.
3. Please see attached a copy of a letter from US of S for Defence (James Wellbeloved MP) to Nicholas Edwards MP in response to a Parliamentary Enquiry about UFO reports in Pembrokeshire. Although this letter is dated 16th June 1977 and not the 15th June as stated in your letter, I believe this is one you have referred to. I also include a copy of the background note by S4(Air) and draft reply as requested. Although not requested, for completeness, I have also included a copy of Nicholas Edwards MP letter to Dr John Gilbert MP as mentioned in the above letter. Personal data concerning members of the public has been removed in accordance with the Data Protection Act 1998.
4. Details of this request have been passed to the RAF Police and I will write to you again about this.

Finally, with regard to your enquiry about a clergyman's letter to the Chief of the Defence Staff in 1977 requested in your last correspondence, we have not yet located this document, but if it should come to light in the near future, we will of course send you a copy.

I hope this is helpful. I will write to you again as soon as possible regarding your fourth request.

Dear Nicholas,

Thank you for your letter of 24th May to John Gilbert about the enquiries you have received recently on the phenomena which are thought to be Unidentified Flying Objects.

The Ministry of Defence has not the resources to conduct an objective scientific enquiry into the nature of UFOs and we do not undertake to identify objects that may be reported by members of the public. For obvious reasons, however, we look into detailed reports of unexplained phenomena to see if they have a bearing on the national defences. My Department have carried out that type of investigation on the reports received from Wales but these have been few in recent months. No evidence has been revealed to suggest that the alleged sightings in Wales, or indeed those reported from other parts of Great Britain in the past, contained anything of significance from a defence point of view. All I can tell you on the basis of the Department's past experience is that most reports of this nature can usually be referred to a common place object which may have been observed perhaps from an unusual angle or in somewhat unusual weather or lighting conditions.

I am sorry I cannot give you a more helpful reply to pass to [redacted], who I understand is a 'co-ordinator' for the British UFO Research Association.

1. Further to my telephone conversation with Flight Lieutenant **Section 40** earlier today, I would be grateful for your assistance with the following request for information.
2. As you may be aware, this section of DAS deals with correspondence concerning 'unidentified flying objects' (UFOs). I attach a copy of a letter we have received from one of our regular correspondents, Dr David Clarke, who has made several requests for information in accordance with the Code of Practice on Access to Government Information (the Code). At request number 4 and in the following paragraph he has requested a copy of an RAF Police report and the full investigation file concerning a sonic boom near Sheffield, Yorkshire on 24 March 1997. Dr Clarke has already been told the outcome of the investigation, namely, that no RAF or NATO aircraft were operating in the area at the time and that civilian aircraft in the area were travelling too slow to have generated a sonic boom.
3. Please could you locate the records requested by Dr Clarke and advise me as to whether they can be released.
4. Also attached for your information, is some details of Dr Clarke's interests in 'Unidentified Flying Objects', taken from his website www.flyingsaucery.com.
5. If you require any further information, please give me a call. Dr Clarke will be told that this aspect of his requests has been passed to the RAF Police and we will write to him as soon as possible.

Thankyou for your letter of 24 March and for the copies of outstanding papers arising from my request for UFO material under the Code of Practice. Since receiving your letter I am reminded that you were searching for a copy of the original letter from the clergyman to the Chief of Defence staff in 1977 that was the basis for my original request. Has this letter been located?

With reference to your point no. 2 in response to my offer of assistance towards your on-going review of UFO records. As I pointed out, I am currently preparing an application to the E.S.R.C., who are an academic research body recognised by the MOD, to undertake a two-year project that will examine the development of public policy towards the UFO problem. My proposal would seem to supplement both your review and your commitment to make further UFO material available to the public under the publication scheme .

Most importantly of all, it would provide vital historical context to primary documents that may otherwise be fragmentary and possibly even misleading. For example, the contents of file **DS8/75/3 Part A** relating to the preparation for the House of Lords debate of 1979 would, if released in its present form be confusing, if not meaningless, without the benefit of a introduction or a chronological index to assist members of the public. The PRO, for instance, routinely publish on their website detailed introductions to supplement their document releases that are prepared in advance by historians with an established interest in the subject area.

As you note it will be a significant task for someone without a detailed knowledge of the history of the subject to review and identify items hidden among the 250 plus files dating back to the 1970s. My offer was made on the understanding that, as you have previously stated, the Ministry has no special interest or expertise in respect of the UFO phenomenon or its interpretation.

For these reasons I hope you will reconsider your decision not to take up my offer to assist, and/or contribute, under the auspices of the E.S.R.C. The application form requires me to indicate if I believe my proposed project would be of interest to MOD, and urges applicants to approach the Ministry in advance of submission, hence my correspondence.

In the meantime would you be able to notify me in advance of any plans to publish or release additional UFO material – apart from the files routinely released at the PRO under the 30 year rule - during the period of my research proposal (2004-6)?

I now wish to make four new applications for copies of material under the Code of Practice for Access to Government Information. These are as follows:

1. A listing of UFO-related records held by MOD, 1976-present, including MOD references and/or PRO references, with file titles and descriptions of contents where available.
2. Copy of file containing RAF Police report into UFOs reported in the Haverfordwest area of West Wales during the spring/summer of 1977. This may be filed alongside a sighting report made to MOD by Mrs Rosa Grenville of the Haven Fort Hotel, Pembrokeshire, on or about 19 April 1977.
3. Background briefing by S4 (Air) and copy of letter from the US of S for Defence (James Wellbeloved MP) to Nicholas Edwards MP for Pembroke, dated 15 June 1977 in response to a Parliamentary Enquiry concerning reports of UFO incidents made in his West Wales constituency.
4. Copy of RAF Police report on their investigation into reports of unidentified low flying aircraft and sonic booms reported near Sheffield, Yorkshire, on 24 March 1997.

The existence of the report referred to in item (4) was confirmed in a letter I received from **Section 40** of Sec(AS)2a, dated 4 January 2000. He said although RAF police reports were 'classified' he was able to provide a summary of its content. However, under the Code I have already successfully applied for and received copies of RAF Police reports with personal details deleted. As no RAF/NATO aircraft were identified during the investigation and no further action taken I now wish to apply for a copy of the full investigation file under the term of the Code.

Thank you for your letter of 24 March and for the copies of outstanding papers arising from my request for UFO material under the Code of Practice. Since receiving your letter I am reminded that you were searching for a copy of the original letter from the clergyman to the Chief of Defence staff in 1977 that was the basis for my original request. Has this letter been located?

With reference to your point no. 2 in response to my offer of assistance towards your on-going review of UFO records. As I pointed out, I am currently preparing an application to the E.S.R.C., who are an academic research body recognised by the MOD, to undertake a two-year project that will examine the development of public policy towards the UFO problem. My proposal would seem to supplement both your review and your commitment to make further UFO material available to the public under the publication scheme .

Most importantly of all, it would provide vital historical context to primary documents that may otherwise be fragmentary and possibly even misleading. For example, the contents of file **DS8/75/3 Part A** relating to the preparation for the House of Lords debate of 1979 would, if released in its present form be confusing, if not meaningless, without the benefit of a introduction or a chronological index to assist members of the public. The PRO, for instance, routinely publish on their website detailed introductions to supplement their document releases that are prepared in advance by historians with an established interest in the subject area.

As you note it will be a significant task for someone without a detailed knowledge of the history of the subject to review and identify items hidden among the 250 plus files dating back to the 1970s. My offer was made on the understanding that, as you have previously stated, the Ministry has no special interest or expertise in respect of the UFO phenomenon or its interpretation.

For these reasons I hope you will reconsider your decision not to take up my offer to assist, and/or contribute, under the auspices of the E.S.R.C. The application form requires me to indicate if I believe my proposed project would be of interest to MOD, and urges applicants to approach the Ministry in advance of submission, hence my correspondence.

In the meantime would you be able to notify me in advance of any plans to publish or release additional UFO material – apart from the files routinely released at the PRO under the 30 year rule - during the period of my research proposal (2004-6)?

I now wish to make four new applications for copies of material under the Code of Practice for Access to Government Information. These are as follows:

1. A listing of UFO-related records held by MOD, 1976-present, including MOD references and/or PRO references, with file titles and descriptions of contents where available.
2. Copy of file containing RAF Police report into UFOs reported in the Haverfordwest area of West Wales during the spring/summer of 1977. This may be filed alongside a sighting report made to MOD by Mrs Rosa Grenville of the Haven Fort Hotel, Pembrokeshire, on or about 19 April 1977.
3. Background briefing by S4 (Air) and copy of letter from the US of S for Defence (James Wellbeloved MP) to Nicholas Edwards MP for Pembroke, dated 15 June 1977 in response to a Parliamentary Enquiry concerning reports of UFO incidents made in his West Wales constituency.
4. Copy of RAF Police report on their investigation into reports of unidentified low flying aircraft and sonic booms reported near Sheffield, Yorkshire, on 24 March 1997.

The existence of the report referred to in item (4) was confirmed in a letter I received from **Section 40** of Sec(AS)2a, dated 4 January 2000. He said although RAF police reports were 'classified' he was able to provide a summary of its content. However, under the Code I have already successfully applied for and received copies of RAF Police reports with personal details deleted. As no RAF/NATO aircraft were identified during the investigation and no further action taken I now wish to apply for a copy of the full investigation file under the term of the Code.

Thank you for your attention to my requests.

1. Further to my letter of 30 January, please find enclosed the following documents:
 - The remaining papers requested from file DS8/75/3 Part A. I apologise for the length of time it has taken to supply these documents which was due to the necessity to consult the Foreign and Commonwealth Office about the sensitivity of the information they contain. You will notice that the documents have been redacted in a different way to those previously sent to you, with in most cases the top and bottom of the document being removed. This is because although it is our practice to supply copies of documents requested wherever possible, the Code of Practice on Access to Government Information (the Code) (Part I paragraph 4) states "there is no commitment that pre-existing documents, as distinct from information, will be made available in response to requests". In light of this, the FCO have requested that if we wish to supply copies of the documents, rather than extracts, that we redact them in this way. The information removed concerns addresses of Departments and individuals within the FCO, contacts with them, and copy addressees.
 - A second copy of the document referred to in paragraph 2 of my letter dated 30 January 2003. As we have now been able to release the documents mentioned above, I can also supply the information in paragraph 5, lines 7 to 9 of this paper which were previously withheld.
 - A copy of an MP's letter to the Secretary of State dated 24 October 1996, the MOD response to which was sent to you with my letter of 9 December 2002.
2. Finally, thank you for your letter of 20 February in which you offer assistance with our review of UFO records. We recognise the public interest in UFO related records and are keen to add further UFO classes of information to the MOD FOI Publication Scheme. We will therefore, shortly be consulting with our colleagues in various branches including the Defence Intelligence staff, the Directorate of Air Operations, and those with responsibility for records management and the Publication Scheme, to decide what material could be released into the Scheme. While this is likely to be a significant task, we believe that the

Department has sufficient staff with the necessary expertise to undertake this work, without external assistance. However, thank you for your interest and should the situation change, we will certainly take your offer into consideration.

3. I hope this is helpful.

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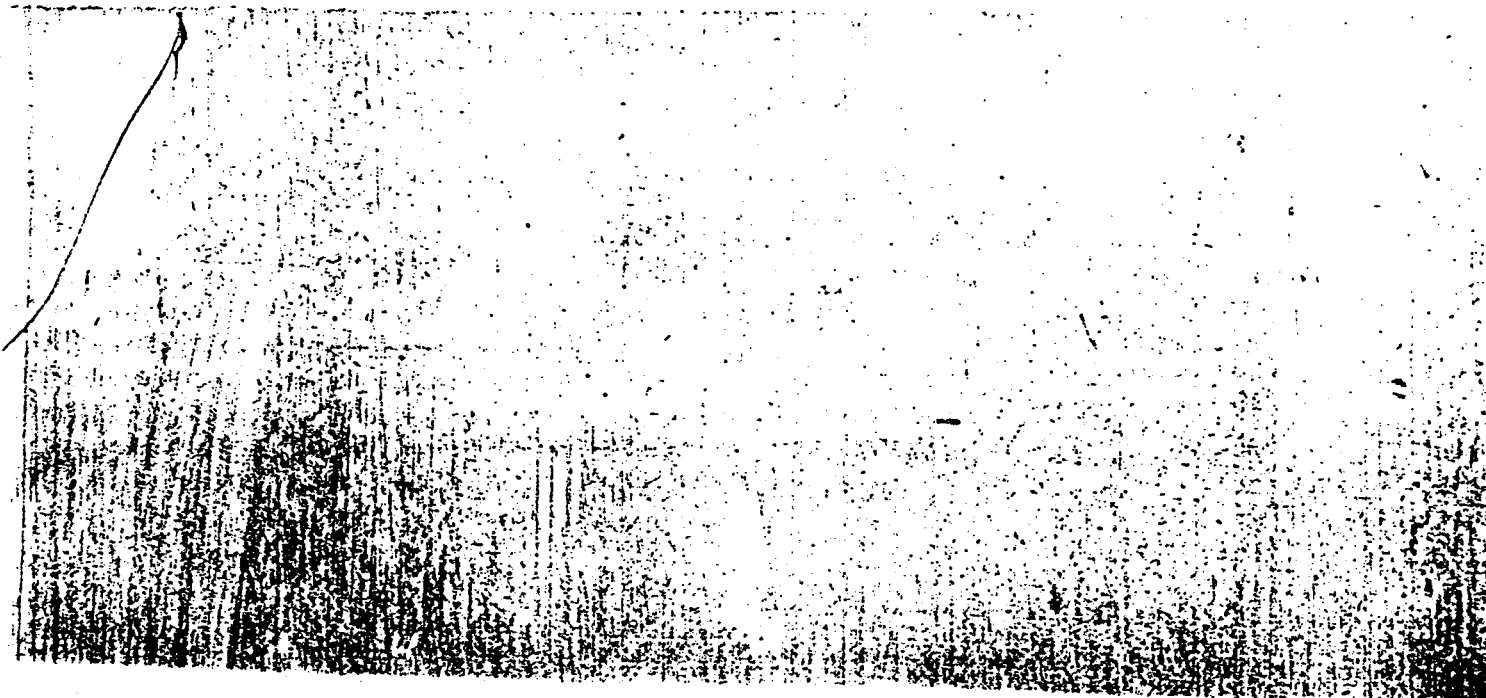

1. WE REMAIN OPPOSED IN PRINCIPLE TO THE GRENADAN INITIATIVE FOR THE REASONS STATED IN THE BRIEF. IF THE RESOLUTION IN YOUR TELNO 2567 IS PUT FORWARD YOU SHOULD OPPOSE IT.
2. WE SHOULD, HOWEVER, BE WILLING TO HELP THE GRENADANS OFF THE HOOK IF IT CAN BE DONE WITHOUT ANY FINANCIAL AND MANPOWER IMPLICATIONS FOR GOVERNMENTS (OTHER THAN GRENADA) OR THE UN. WE COULD THEREFORE ABSTAIN ON A PROPOSAL TO ESTABLISH A GROUP OF EXPERTS OR A SPECIAL RAPPOREUR, PROVIDED THAT AS WE ASSUME FROM YOUR TELEGRAM 2566 THE GROUP'S ACTIVITIES WOULD BE FINANCED BY THE GOVERNMENT OF GRENADA. IT WOULD ALSO HELP IF THE SUBJECT COULD BE PUT ON THE AGENDA OF THE 35TH SESSION; IN LINE WITH THE RECOMMENDATION IN THE SECRETARY-GENERAL'S ANNUAL REPORT THAT ITEMS SHOULD NOT AUTOMATICALLY GO ON THE AGENDA FROM SESSION TO SESSION.
3. YOU SHOULD ALSO KEEP IN MIND GRENADA'S ABSENCE (WHETHER PLANNED OR FORTUITOUS, WE DO NOT KNOW) FROM THE FOURTH COMMITTEE VOTE ON FOREIGN ECONOMIC INTERESTS. THE FRG MAY BE WELL PLACED TO SUGGEST TO THE DELEGATION OF GRENADA THAT SOME DELEGATIONS WOULD BE BETTER DISPOSED TO ACCEPT A PROPOSAL ON THE LINES OF PARA 2 ABOVE IF GRENADA WERE TO ABSTAIN IN THE PLENARY VOTE ON FOREIGN ECONOMIC INTERESTS.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS: UN INITIATIVE BY GRENADA

Problem

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1. How to react to further proposals by Grenada, following up their 1977 initiative on UFOs.

Background

- A 2. At last year's General Assembly Premier Gairy of Grenada urged the United Nations to establish an agency or working group for research into unidentified flying objects. Mr [REDACTED] expressed the view that the proposal would bring the UN into disrepute. Accordingly, the UK delegation was instructed to oppose the draft Grenadan resolution. In the event, no vote was taken on the resolution; as a compromise, the General Assembly "studied the text" and requested the Secretary-General to transmit it to state members of the UN and to interested specialised agencies so that they might communicate their views to the Secretary-General.
- B 3. The Secretary-General's subsequent report contained only three replies from Governments, (India, Luxembourg and the Seychelles) and unforthcoming reactions from two specialised agencies.
- C 4. The Permanent Mission of Grenada circulated a letter to Permanent Missions in New York on 10 November, which was followed up by a statement to the Special Political Committee on 27 November by the Prime Minister of Grenada, who complicated matters by introducing a new resolution instead of the one previously circulated. Subsequent developments are reported in UKMIS telno 2566 of 27 November.

Argument

6. The Grenadan initiative continues to hold no attractions whatsoever for us. It is obvious, however, that some of our Western partners /including

(including the FRG Presidency and the United States) are making an effort to help Grenada off the hook if this can be done without cost to the UN. It must also be said, in fairness, that the Grenadan proposal is no more ridiculous than many other proposals before the UN. Indeed President Carter has in the past reportedly taken a personal interest in the subject of UFOs. The proposal is at least not positively harmful to UK interests, whereas taking too strong and open a stand against Mr Gairy could be. Moreover, if we can help the Grenadans to reach a compromise, it could conceivably help us to persuade them to abstain on the vote on foreign economic and other interests in plenary (the Fourth Committee Resolution which inter alia strongly condemns the UK and others for dealings with South Africa).

Recommendation

7. I recommend that we instruct the Mission to continue to resist the original Grenadan proposal but to give discreet support to efforts by Western or other countries to postpone or reduce the scope and cost of the Grenadan proposal as much as possible. I accordingly submit a draft telegram to UKMIS New York.
8. UND were consulted on UN aspects, and concur.

THE NEW RESOLUTION ELABORATES ON THE IDEA IN THE INDIAN REPLY TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL (A/33/269), PROPOSING INTER ALIA THAT THE SECRETARY-GENERAL SHOULD APPOINT A THREE-MEMBER GROUP OF EXPERTS MEETING UNDER THE AEGIS OF THE OUTER SPACE COMMITTEE AND REPORTING THROUGH THAT COMMITTEE TO THE 34TH SESSION. (TEXT IN MIFT).

2. THERE HAD BEEN NO PRIOR WARNING THAT THE GRENADANS INTENDED TABLING A NEW RESOLUTION TODAY AND MEMBERS OF THE OUTER SPACE COMMITTEE, PARTICULARLY THE AUSTRIAN CHAIRMAN WHO HAD NOT BEEN CONSULTED, WERE STRONGLY OPPOSED TO THIS FURTHER ATTEMPT TO INVOLVE THE OUTER SPACE COMMITTEE IN THE SUBJECT OF UFOS. THE AUSTRIANS, AMONG OTHERS, PRIVATELY INTIMATED THEIR DISMAY TO THE GRENADAN MISSION, WHO BY THE END OF THE AFTERNOON MEETING GAVE SIGNS OF REGRETTING THEIR PRECIPITANCE. 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3. THIS WILL ALLOW TIME TO WORK OUT AN ALTERNATIVE PROPOSAL. THE GERMANS, WITH AUSTRIAN BACKING, FAVOUR A GROUP OF EXPERTS TO BE APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNMENT OF GRENADA, WHICH MIGHT IN DUE COURSE REPORT ITS FINDINGS TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL. THE US MISSION, WHEN MR GAIRY CALLED ON THEM ON 24 NOVEMBER, FLOATED THE IDEA OF A SPECIAL RAPPORTEUR (TO BE FINANCED BY THE GOVERNMENT OF GRENADA) WHO WOULD STUDY THE PROBLEM AND REPORT BACK TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL. THE RUSSIANS WOULD LIKE TO SEE A REPETITION OF THE PROCEDURE ADOPTED LAST YEAR: IE TO DEFER THE ITEM WITH SOME FACE-SAVING PROPOSAL FOR FURTHER COMMENTS BY INTERESTED PARTIES, OR A FURTHER STUDY. THIS LAST WOULD BE THE BEST SOLUTION, BUT GAIRY IS SAYING THAT HE WILL NOT BE PUT OFF AGAIN THIS YEAR.

4. WE ASSUME THAT YOU WOULD NOT WISH THIS SUBJECT TO BE LANDED IN THE LAP OF THE OUTER SPACE COMMITTEE. IT WOULD BE HELPFUL, IN THE NEGOTIATIONS WHICH ARE BOUND TO TAKE PLACE DURING THE NEXT FEW DAYS, TO HAVE AN INDICATION AS TO WHETHER YOU WOULD INCLINE TO AN ABSTENTION OR A VOTE AGAINST IN RESPECTABLE COMPANY ON THE RESOLUTION IN NY I.F.T. WE ASSUME, ALSO, THAT YOU WOULD WISH US TO WORK FOR ALTERNATIVES ON THE LINES DESCRIBED IN PARAGRAPH 3 ABOVE. IT WOULD BE HELPFUL TO HAVE ANY COMMENTS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.

1. THIS ITEM IS NOW SCHEDULED TO START ON MONDAY 27 NOVEMBER IN THE SPC. IT IS EXPECTED THAT THE FIRST MEETING WILL OPEN WITH A STATEMENT BY MR GAIRY, THE PRIME MINISTER OF GRENADA, (WHO IS COMING TO NEW YORK ESPECIALLY FOR THE OCCASION) AND WILL BE FOLLOWED BY STATEMENTS BY SEVERAL EXPERTS ON UFO'S WHO ARE ACCOMPANYING MR GAIRY, AND BY A WALT DISNEY FILM WHICH MR GAIRY HAS ALSO LAID ON. THE COMMITTEE WILL THEN MOVE ON TO ANOTHER ITEM TO ALLOW TIME FOR CONSULTATIONS.

2. THE IDEA IS TO LET MR GAIRY HAVE HIS DAY, WAITING UNTIL HE HAS LEFT NEW YORK BEFORE ATTEMPTING TO NEGOTIATE A COMPROMISE WITH THE GRENADA MISSION WHICH WILL IDEALLY REQUIRE MINIMAL, OR EVEN NO, UN INVOLVEMENT AND NO ADDITIONAL UN EXPENDITURE. VARIOUS IDEAS ARE BEGINNING TO BE DISCUSSED IN THE CORRIDORS. WE MAY BE ABLE TO REPORT AFTER MONDAYS MEETING WHICH LOOK WORTH CONSIDERING.

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AGENDA ITEM NO. 128: REDACTION ON ORIGINAL DOCUMENT

1. The attached letter which has been circulated to Missions by the Permanent Mission of Grenada is self-explanatory. In their preliminary soundings this year, it would seem that the Mission of Grenada has found little if any support for its more ambitious proposal for establishing an agency, or department, and is therefore falling back on a more modest proposal.

2. I assume that you would wish us if possible to discourage this too, provided we are in good company and do not take the lead. It is possible however that it will acquire support as a fallback position which the majority will be prepared to go along with to save Grenada's face. We will keep in close touch with our allies.

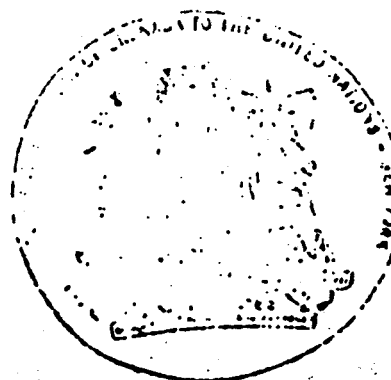

The General Assembly,

Mindful of its commitment to promote international co-operation in solving international problems,

Aware of the growing interest taken by people of the world in Unidentified Flying Objects and related Phenomena which continue to baffle mankind, and in strange happenings in various parts of the world.....

Noting the statement made by the Prime Minister of Grenada at the 30th, 31st, 32nd, and 33rd Session of the General Assembly regarding these baffling phenomena, and his appeal to have the United Nations conduct and co-ordinate research into Unidentified Flying Objects and related phenomena and to disseminate more widely among the Nations of the world information and other data gathered.

Recognising the commitment to research into these phenomena demonstrated by individual scientists, researchers, educational institutions and National Governments.

1. Recommends that there be initiated a special official United Nations study on the nature and relationship of Unidentified Flying Objects and extra-terrestrial phenomena.
2. Requests The Secretary-General to appoint at the earliest possible date an "ad hoc group of experts" of not more than seven (7) scientific experts drawn from within the United Nations Secretariat and from private research organisations with the task of elaborating a possible framework for the above-mentioned study.
3. Further requests the Secretary-General to make available to the ad hoc group of experts all the relevant material, including proposals made by Member States as well as previous and current studies available on the subject.
4. Further requests the Committee to submit a preliminary report on its work by June 1, 1979.
5. Further requests the Secretary-General to transmit the preliminary report of the ad hoc group of experts to Member States not later than July 30th, 1979.
6. Decides to include in the provisional agenda of the Thirty Fourth Session of the General Assembly the item entitled "Report of the ad hoc group of experts" to investigate the nature and relationship of Unidentified Flying Objects and extra-terrestrial phenomena.
7. Decides further that a comprehensive report of the committee will be tabled at the 35th Regular Session of the General Assembly.

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A UK AIMS

To oppose the establishment of any such agency.

B POINTS TO MAKE

2. The British delegation does not think that the establishment of an agency for research into unidentified flying objects is appropriate to the functions of the United Nations. It considers that the existence of such an agency under UN auspices would be an unjustifiable drain on UN resources which could be better deployed elsewhere.

C TACTICS

3. Hopefully a confrontation with the representative of Grenada can be avoided, but the UK should not hesitate to make its views known as and when appropriate. You should seek whatever support you can particularly among the Nine.

BACKGROUND

4. At last year's UN General Assembly, the Grenadan delegation, with the full support of Premier Gairy, sought to establish an ad hoc working group of the UN to evaluate UFO reports. FCO Ministers expressed the view that to set up any such body would reduce the credibility of the UN; accordingly the UK delegation was instructed to oppose. In the event, no vote was taken on the Grenadan Resolution; as a compromise, the General Assembly "studied the text" and requested the Secretary-General to transmit it "to states members of the UN and to interested specialised agencies so that they might communicate their views to the Secretary-General".

1. WE REMAIN FIRMLY OPPOSED TO A GRENADA RESOLUTION ON UFOS. WE DO NOT CONSIDER SUCH OPPOSITION LIKELY TO BE DAMAGING EITHER TO THE UK OR TO THE UN. YOU SHOULD, THEREFORE, MAKE NO ATTEMPT TO CONCEAL THE UK'S INTENTION OF VOTING AGAINST ANY RESOLUTION CONTAINING AN OPERATIONAL OUTCOME, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER OR NOT THIS LEAVES US IN A MINORITY.
2. IF THE GRENADANS CAN BE PERSUADED TO ABANDON THEIR RESOLUTION WE THINK THAT REFERRAL OF THEIR UFO INTEREST TO THE COMMITTEE ON OUTER SPACE WOULD PROVIDE THE BEST FACE SAVING DEVICE. THIS COMMITTEE IS AFTER ALL THE ESTABLISHED UN BODY DEALING WITH OUTER SPACE MATTERS. WE UNDERSTAND THE AUSTRIAN CHAIRMAN'S ANXIETIES BUT THINK THAT IN VIEW OF THE COMMITTEE'S EXISTING WORK LOAD, THIS ITSELF SHOULD BE A REASONABLE GUARANTEE THAT THE UFO ISSUE WOULD BE PLACED AT THE BOTTOM OF ITS AGENDA WITH A FAIR CHANCE OF BEING IGNORED INDEFINITELY.
3. WE ARE LESS ATTRACTED TO THE SUGGESTION IN PARAGRAPH 6 OF TELNO. 2241. IT HAS THE DISADVANTAGE THAT ONCE THE UFO ISSUE WAS INSCRIBED AS AN AGENDA ITEM FOR THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY IT WOULD BE THERE IN BLACK AND WHITE AND WE COULD NOT REPEAT NOT BE CERTAIN THAT CONTINUING PRESSURE FROM GRENADA, PERHAPS WITH THE SUPPORT OF OTHER DELEGATIONS, WOULD NOT LEAD TO ITS DISCUSSION EITHER AT THE 33RD OR 34TH SESSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

The meeting was called to order at 3.45 p.m.

AGENDA ITEM 126: ESTABLISHMENT OF AN AGENCY OR A DEPARTMENT OF THE UNITED NATIONS FOR UNDERTAKING, CO-ORDINATING AND DISSEMINATING THE RESULTS OF RESEARCH INTO UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS AND RELATED PHENOMENA (continued) (A/33/141, A/33/268; A/SPC/33/L.20)

1. [REDACTED] (Grenada)* read out a letter from [REDACTED], a former astronaut, expressing the belief that unidentified flying objects were extraterrestrial vehicles whose crews were visiting Earth from more technically advanced planets. [REDACTED] had himself spent two days in 1951 observing UFOs of different sizes flying in fighter formation, generally from east to west over Europe. A top-level co-ordinated programme was needed to collect and analyse data from all over the world concerning all types of encounters and to determine how best to make friendly contact with such visitors. Man might have to prove to the visitors that he had learned to solve his problems by peaceful means rather than by warfare before he could be accepted as a fully qualified universal team member. Such acceptance would have tremendous possibilities for the advancement of the world in all areas, and it would certainly seem that the United Nations had an interest in handling the subject properly and expeditiously. If the United Nations agreed to pursue the project, many more well-qualified people might agree to provide help and information.
2. [REDACTED] (Grenada)* said it was important to remember that men throughout the world had something in common: they were all earthlings, a fact which tended to be forgotten when man's many differences were aired. After 20 years of study, he believed that there was overwhelming evidence to suggest that the planet was being visited by intelligently controlled extraterrestrial vehicles. The evidence took the form of eye-witness testimony from responsible persons, physical trace cases producing changes in the environment observable long after the UFO had left, radar visual sightings, photographs and abductions, apparently by aliens of earthlings and the subsequent return of the earthlings, although there was no knowledge of cases where earthlings had not been returned.
3. Every large-scale scientific study of UFOs had provided a substantial number of cases in which the observations clearly indicated that the UFO was a manufactured object behaving in ways which could not be duplicated by manufactured objects on Earth. The ability of UFOs to move and manoeuvre at thousands of miles an hour, without any visible external engine, wings or tail, indicated that the spacecraft had been manufactured by someone other than man. Many people wished to know why UFOs should visit Earth and what was happening on Earth that could be of interest to an advanced civilization. Probably there were many things of interest to someone concerned with the development of a primitive society. However, one thing was guaranteed to be of interest to another civilization and that was the fact that within one hundred years men would be going to the stars. He himself, as a nuclear physicist, had worked on fission and fusion propulsion systems which would be capable of transporting man to nearby star systems within reasonable periods of time, and it would be obvious to any alien in the neighbourhood that man would be doing so within a hundred years. Since the end of the Second World War, with the development

of nuclear weapons, rockets and electronics, man had become of interest to other, advanced civilizations. Naturally, such civilizations would be concerned with their own survival and security and would therefore wish to be informed of the activities of another civilization which was just beginning space travel; it was therefore clear that the UFOs were obtaining data for their own purposes, acting as a kind of galactic federation intelligence agency.

4. People also wondered why UFOs did not make contact. He suggested that there was no one leader with whom such alien beings could make contact. Whereas the smallest reasonable political unit on a galactic neighbourhood basis was a planet or a solar system, from the alien viewpoint man's was a primitive society whose major activity was tribal warfare; it would make no more sense for alien beings to speak to individual countries than for the United Nations to address individual cities.

5. Some people were worried at the significance of flying saucers and wondered why, in the light of the importance of questions of peace, survival and hunger, people should concern themselves with such matters. He suggested that man's very survival might depend on his taking an earthling orientation. The easiest way of doing so was for him to try to see himself as others saw him. From up above, coming into the planet Earth, there were no boundary lines. Acceptance of oneself as an earthling would become natural when it was recognized that the planet Earth was being visited.

6. There were also practical aspects such as the significance of man's acquiring motive propulsion which would enable him to travel and to transport goods from place to place without using the traditional means of transport and without expending valuable resources which were normally burned and thrown away. It was clear that aliens had solved problems such as the development of new and better means of producing energy. In addition, the Earth might well have some resources which could be exported to alien civilizations; as the densest planet in the solar system, the Earth had more valuable heavy metals than any other planet in the neighbourhood and might also have plant life and other materials which would be of interest to aliens.

7. Modern astronomy frequently assumed, in relation to the possibility of contact with extraterrestrial intelligences, that all other solar systems were isolated in the same manner as our own, in which the nearest star to the sun was four light years away. However, within our own galactic neighbourhood there were approximately 1,000 stars, of which 46 were similar to the sun and might well be expected to have planets and life; some of those planets would be much older than Earth. In addition, research into UFOs had revealed the existence of two sun-like stars, Zeta I Reticulae and Zeta II Reticulae, which were separated by only three light weeks; such close proximity would suggest that interstellar travel and communication might have been developed much earlier than on our isolated planet. Three recent professional publications had expressed the view that our entire galaxy had probably already been colonized. Perhaps the most important thing to recognize was that the next generation would grow up in a drastically different situation; unless something was done to prevent it, another dozen countries would soon have nuclear weapons and the world would be further divided into groups instead of becoming the earthling civilization which was necessary for its survival.

8. [REDACTED] (Grenada) invited members of the Committee to make suggestions and recommendations concerning the draft resolution submitted by his delegation (A/SPC/33/L.20); his delegation was very flexible as to the actual mechanism to be decided on by the Committee for monitoring and co-ordinating research into UFOs and would be interested to hear the ideas of other delegations on the matter. He assumed that the vote on the resolution would take place at a later date.
9. The CHAIRMAN said that the substantive consideration of and vote on the resolution would be deferred until a later meeting.
10. [REDACTED] (Liberia) requested that the statements made by the members of the delegation of Grenada should be reproduced in extenso in the records so that delegates could study them more closely.
11. The CHAIRMAN recalled that the General Assembly, at the 4th plenary meeting of its current session, had decided to maintain the option that had traditionally been approved for the Special Political Committee to obtain transcriptions of debates of some of its meetings, or portions thereof.
12. [REDACTED] (United Kingdom) asked what the financial implications of such action would be.
13. The CHAIRMAN said that such expenditure as might be incurred by the provision of transcriptions of the Committee's debates was considered to be part of the normal work of the General Assembly; there were no direct financial implications. If he heard no objection, he would take it that the Committee approved the request made by the representative of Liberia.
14. It was so decided.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

1. You asked me to comment on loose minute DCDS(I)/52 dated 9 December 1977. As you know, S4(Air) are responsible for answering public enquiries and for briefing Ministers on MPs' questions about UFOs. I attach our stock reply which has been endorsed by successive Ministers *and which, if you agree, might serve as the basis of the reply to CDS's correspondent.*
2. So far as I know there has been no British Scientific enquiry into the possible existence of UFOs, nor is there evidence that MOD has taken the question very seriously. However, we have kept in touch with the United States Air Force who made a systematic, if protracted, attempt to record and investigate UFO sightings from 1952 to 1968. The USAF enquiry, known as Project Blue Book, was followed by a study which was originally suggested by a member of a congressional investigation in the Armed Forces Committee and which was assigned by the Air Force Office of Scientific Research to the University of Colorado. It was led by Dr Edward V Condon, Professor of Physics and formerly Director of the National Bureau of Standards. This is the enquiry referred to in the attached brief and, as stated there, it was endorsed in 1969 by the National Academy of Sciences who concluded that there was no scientific or military justification for further study of UFOs, that the reports of UFOs up to that time posed no threat to national security and that continuance of the Blue Book Project was of doubtful value. The Condon report caused a good deal of controversy and, I believe, was much criticised. However, when I consulted the RAF Staff in Washington about this they assured me in August 1976 that HQ USAF saw no likelihood of their further involvement in this area. The USAF pointed to the considerable Air Force commitment of resources in the past, the extreme pressure on Air Force funds in 1976 and the fact that since 1969 no evidence had been presented to warrant further investigation.
3. It is always possible of course, that the considerable correspondence addressed to MOD might contain some hint, not of UFOs, but of something with a hostile terrestrial origin which could have a bearing on national security. We have therefore been careful to refer all UFO enquiries from the public to ADI55 and DD Ops (GE)(RAF) for any further investigation which they might consider to be justified. As a Secretariat branch, S4(Air) does not need to know about this type of enquiry and we do not ask for further information; we tell the public flatly that we cannot enter into detailed correspondence, and enquiries are not necessarily made to the point of positive identification. The only exception to this is the occasional case where a Member of Parliament shows exceptional interest or concern and we seek ADI 55's advice so that the Minister can reply more fully and specifically than the standard draft allows.
4. That is all there really is to the MOD UFO "policy" except that we do not publish the correspondence from the public. The only reason for that is lack of staff; we would have to obliterate the identities of our many correspondents, and possibly occasional references to classified subjects, and there is no one we can spare for the job.

5. As it happens, however, I was about to seek confirmation of the general line we take even before you consulted me on the letter sent to CDS. There is always a steady public interest in UFOs and from time to time it tends to increase unaccountably. There was a sustained flurry in the 1960s which was sufficient to embroil my predecessor in a BBC TV programme. Last summer there was some concern in Wales although the RAF Police thought this could have been the work of a practical joker. In the last few weeks the Prime Minister of Grenada has secured a UFO debate at the United Nations (which could conceivably involve the Foreign Office and No 10 in correspondence) and he has also had discussions with Mr Jimmy Carter whom the Press have connected with UFOs in the past. Then a few days ago the Earl of Glancarty put down a number of questions in the House of Lords referring to UFO investigations allegedly under way in France and a broadcast said to have been made in 1974 by the Contemporary French Minister of Defence. (See Hansard extracts attached).

6. We believe that [REDACTED] is a Vice President of the British UFO Research Association. I should add that we were unable to verify the alleged Ministerial broadcast when a member of the public told us in 1976 that in it the French had admitted the existence of flying saucers. The British Air Attache in Paris did find out however that the French operate a procedure under which UFO reports from the public go in the first instance to the French Defence Ministry (Air) who study the military implications and finally to a Government organisation known as the Centre Nationale D'Etude Spatial where the reports are considered by scientists. The reports are also fed into a computer where they are "added to the statistics of the problem". We were advised that the French military authorities had found nothing of an aggressive nature in the sightings although their scientists had been unable to explain the phenomena. As this information came to us by telephone I have now written to the Air Attache to document it and up date it in the light of the Earl of Glancarty's questions.

7. One way and another there could be renewed interest in UFOs in the next few months and I have already been asked to take stock of our current policy. The basic questions are: -

- a. Should we take flying saucers seriously?
- b. Is the general MOD policy valid (as outlined in the attached brief and as supplemented above)?
- c. Is it correct to confine MOD investigations to the defence implications of alleged UFO sightings - should the investigations be extended either in the interest of national defence or more widely into the more speculative field concerning the possible existence of extra terrestrial vehicles?
- d. Should MOD take the public more seriously and, for example, visit the places where sightings have been reported (a line of enquiry; I might add which could not be undertaken by S4(Air)'s slender establishment)?

8. I should be most grateful if you would seek the views of DSTI and Air Cdre (Int) whom I believe you will be consulting before reporting to CDS.

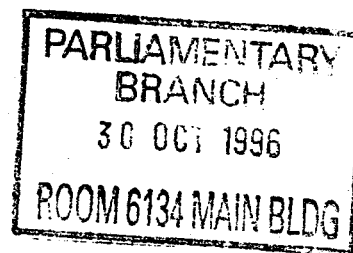

Dear *Michael,*

I am very concerned about an incident that occurred off the East Anglian coast recently, involving a visual unidentified flying craft sighting which was correlated by various different military radar systems. I have attached, for your information, copies of some recent press reports.

From these press reports it would seem as if the unidentified flying craft was seen by the crew of a tanker; the crew of a civil aircraft; police at Skegness (who took a video), and police at Boston. Simultaneously, the object seems to have been picked up on military radar systems at R.A.F. Neatishead, R.A.F. Waddington, and R.A.F. Northwood, together with systems at London and at Anglia radar.

What strikes me as incredible is that no aircraft were scrambled when an uncorrelated target was picked up so close to the coast. This raises for me, serious issues about the way in which we police the U.K. Air Defence Region (U.K.A.D.R.). Given that we have Tornado F.3 aircraft based at R.A.F. Leuchars; R.A.F. Leeming; and R.A.F. Coningsby, should not one of these bases have had Air Defence aircraft on Quick Reaction Alert (Q.R.A.), and should a launch not have been ordered? I am also unclear as to the involvement of R.A.F. Kinloss in Scotland, home of our Nimrod Maritime Patrol Aircraft.

A story seems to have been put around that the radar systems were picking up Boston's church tower! Although "ground clutter" can give spurious returns around certain radar heads, my understanding is that the locations of such areas are well known, and that such an effect is unlikely to be repeated on so many different radar systems. Some of the Air Traffic Control radars might have difficulty with ground clutter, but Air Defence radar systems and their skilled operators should know the difference. This "explanation" also fails to take account of the visual sightings.

Naturally, all sorts of rumours are circulating: no Q.R.A. aircraft were available at R.A.F. Coningsby, which is just a few miles from the Wash; the R.A.F. wanted to scramble aircraft but were overruled "at the highest level"; the video taken by the police has disappeared into the bowels of your Ministry's Main Building. While I am interested in finding out what was seen, my primary concern stems from the absolute shambles that such events seem to cause. The R.A.F. are supposed, or so I believed, to be responsible for keeping a watchful eye on activity in the U.K.A.D.R., but seem to have no idea as to what is going on. Do they have no standard procedure for such incidents? They had enough time to think about it, because the object was on radar for upwards of seven hours! These concerns remain, even if there is a prosaic explanation for this specific incident.

I could think of countless other questions that concern me based on the points I have raised in this letter and in the various press reports, but I will confine myself, in addition to the above, if you will answer the following questions in respect of the unidentified flying craft sighting that occurred on 4th./5th. October in the vicinity of the Wash, and subsequently reported to your Department:

1. If you will detail the role played by those military establishments who picked up on their radar systems or were otherwise involved in events, and if you will comment on the video of the sighting sent to your Department by the Boston police?
2. Why no aircraft were scrambled to investigate the unidentified flying craft seen by the police; the crew of a civil aircraft; and the crew of a tanker on 4th./5th. October, given that at least three military establishments reported having detected the unidentified flying craft on radar?
3. Whether it is the R.A.F.'s standard practice to ignore sightings of unidentified flying craft which are correlated by radar, or whether there is a requirement to investigate such phenomena by scrambling aircraft?

I look forward to your reply with great interest.

Out of this world

This is the transcript of the conversations between coastguards, RAF stations in Norfolk, Scotland and London, police and North Sea tanker Conocoast when strange lights were seen in the night sky at the weekend. It is the recording taken at Yarmouth Coastguard headquarters:

0314 Skegness police: "We can see a strange red-and-green rotating light in the sky directly south-east from Skegness. It looks strange as it is stationary and there is no aircraft sound in the area."

0326 RAF Kinloss: "Northwood have a radar contact bearing 221 degrees at 16 miles, it looks to be stationary and there is no way of determining its height but it must be quite a size to be visible from Skegness."

0331 Kinloss: "Neatishead now confirms a couple of radar contacts in the area but no height, they seem to be stationary. There are definitely no military aircraft in the area and no notified civil flights should be there."

0346 Conocoast tanker: "We have these lights on visual. Now they are flashing red, green and white. Cannot identify it as an aircraft as it looks stationary and it is approximately one mile high."

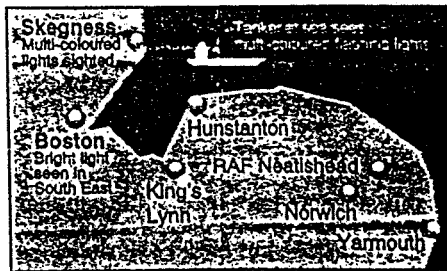
Yarmouth Coastguard: "Did you see from which direction it appeared?"

Conocoast: "No. It just appeared and is stationary."

0353 Kinloss: "Neatishead say it could be caused by the weather"

Coastguard: "I don't think so as we have visual contact."

Kinloss: "Well, Neatishead and Northwood report that there is no transponder on this



object and therefore no means of interrogation. It is obvious that whatever it is it does not want anyone to know that it is there. Also Neatishead report its position as directly over Boston."

0408 Conocoast: "It is still stationary and flashing red, green, blue and white. It looks very high, north of us, and there is no engine noise."

0417 Coastguard: "Skegness, can you get video footage as the RAF are very interested and may require it later."

0427 Kinloss: "Neatishead are keeping a log of what looks like clutter on the radar."

0445 Yarmouth Coastguard: "Conocoast, can you give us an update?"

Conocoast: "We can see two lights flashing green and red."

0501 Coastguard: "Give us both bearings of the two lights"

Conocoast: "There is one stationary light at 345 deg true and the other at 160 true, the lights are both visible with the naked eye and both exhibit the same characteristics flashing red, blue, green and white."

0517 Boston police: "We can still see the light. It is towards the south-east and seems about 40-45 degrees in the sky. It is just a bright light to us."

0521 Kinloss: "Neatishead are running a trace on this and cannot explain it. If they are helicopters they are fast approaching the end of their endurance as it is well over two hours since the first report let alone how long they were up there before they were actually sighted."

0552 Conocoast: "We can still see the lights, and they are on their original bearings and flashing the same colours but they seem higher and dimmer"

0708 Flight Lieutenant McFarlane, Neatishead: "We had a report from Northwood that a civil flight had also reported strange lights in the area. They fit exactly what was seen from the ground, multi-coloured, flashing, stationary lights."

0731 Flight Lieutenant George, Northwood: "This echo is still on our screens and we cannot explain this at all apart from it being a meteorological phenomenon but then again we have visual sightings also. The civilian flight that reported these lights as a flare was six miles away at the time. All very strange."

1109 Neatishead: "The object still has not moved, London radar and Waddington can also see it."

1920 Anglia radar: "There is nothing there now. We are of the opinion that it was the Boston Stump."

Wind: Force Four. Visibility: 20 miles.

Did you see the mysterious bright lights?

The source of "strange" bright lights spotted in the sky off East Anglia at the weekend remained a mystery last night.

Police, the RAF and shipping reported the appearance of two large, unexplained objects above the Wash in the early hours of Saturday.

Baffled personnel at RAF Neatishead spent hours tracking the UFOs, described by witnesses as large, about a mile up in the sky, and with blue, white, red and green flashing lights.

The Ministry of Defence said it

was taking the sightings seriously and "all possibilities" would be covered.

Spokesman Nigel Sergeant said: "We are trying to prove that it does not represent any sort of security threat and that it was not an aggressive intrusion into our airspace. This is one of the bigger sightings recently and has caused quite a bit of interest."

Skegness police called the coastguards at 3.14am on Saturday after seeing a number of objects flashing in the sky, which were also spotted by colleagues at Boston.

Sightings, which continued until the objects disappeared off radar screens at about 11am on Saturday, later came from a tanker and a civilian aircraft, while two military radar stations verified "strange" traces.

Flt Lt Keith Sweatman, of RAF Neatishead, said: "We have not been able to offer an explanation."

"The number of independent reports we have had suggest there is something to follow up. We will be investigating thoroughly."

Witnesses heard no aircraft noise and military radar showed no

aircraft, civil or military, in the area, apart from the civilian flight which reported "strange lights."

Military officials said no airforce planes had been scrambled to investigate.

Coastguards yesterday suggested the lights might have been Venus. But Ian Morison, a scientist at the radio astronomy observatory at Jodrell Bank, said this was unlikely as the planet would not have been visible after sunrise. Sightings off coast tracked by air base

It was confirmed that the base had not been conducting operations in the area at the time of the sighting.

Special 'Q' aircraft normally investigate UFO sightings, but there were none available at the time as the nearest one was at RAF Leuchars in Scotland.

The MoD has a special cell which investigates all reported UFO sightings. It will be carrying out extensive checks into what was seen.

A spokesman for Skegness Police said: "We had calls which suggested a large bright object over the coast. In the past, sightings like this have been either a plane or a weather balloon but we have not yet had this confirmed."

Stumped?

The truth was out there. But even agent Mulder of the X-Files would find it hard to believe. The great East Anglian UFO mystery was solved last night – and turned out to be just a storm and a church tower. The weekend sightings of colourful flashing lights over the Wash captured the imagination of would-be X-Files sleuths across the region. Letters and telephone calls flooded into the EDP after the sightings, which coincided with the appearance of a mysterious object on radars. One theory was that the culprit was planet Venus. But Norfolk RAF investigators have now found logical explanations – and have ruled out the possibility of little green men peering down on us. Flight Lt Keith Sweatman, of RAF Neatishead, said: "We now know that the radar trace was Boston Stump – the church tower at Boston. "And the weather people said that the coloured lights in the sky coincided with an electrical storm over the Wash. "You do get weird experiences with electrical storms, and they can produce lots of different colours." The 200ft church tower would have been ruled out if it had been picked up by a more advanced RAF radar, which can computer-enhance images. But the air traffic control radar did not have similar facilities, and operators jumped to the conclusion that it must have been linked with the flashing red, blue, green and white lights, seen by the tanker Conocoast. Following the weekend sightings, an investigation was launched by the Ministry of Defence to ensure they did not pose a threat to national security. That has now been discounted. The mystery is expected to be cleared up once and for all in the next couple of days when experts at RAF Neatishead view video footage of the lights. They are waiting for the video to arrive after being sent from Boston police. Flight Lt Sweatman stressed they would be keeping an open mind. "I don't totally discount UFOs," he said. "I'm not a disbeliever, but I'm not a believer either."

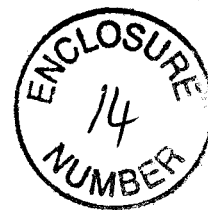

Thank you for your letter of 30 January 2003 and for enclosing the copies of the additional UFO-related papers I had requested, arising from the Parliamentary Correspondence file.

I am grateful for the detailed answers you provided to the additional points I raised, and I now await your decision on the release of a) the remaining papers from file **DS8/75/3 Part A** and b) the letter from the late Martin Redmond MP in file **D/Sec(AS)64/2**.

In the meantime, with reference to my inquiry about the future of UFO records that are less than 30 years old, I note that you "will be reviewing the information we hold to see what material may be made more generally available via the MOD Freedom of Information Publication Scheme."

Your commitment to make material more freely available via the Internet is commendable. As you no doubt appreciate, there is continuing public, media and academic interest in these records, as reflected in their inclusion in the MOD Publication Scheme announced in the Lord Chancellor's Department Press Notice 424/02 (28 November 2002).

The early release of this material is undoubtedly the most effective way to dispel misconceptions about the Ministry's limited involvement in this area, and to demonstrate the FOIA working in practice. However, I do appreciate that the reviewing of records to remove personal information has always posed a major logistical problem. Given your Secretariat's limited time and resources, such matters quite understandably remain a low priority given more pressing defence concerns.

I understand that your 'UFO' records are currently split between three locations: a) those awaiting release at the PRO, b) those at the 'midway position' in MOD archives and c) those most recent files retained in your office. If you are serious about your intention to

review these records so that additional material could be made available from 2005, a detailed inventory of the content of existing 'UFO' files in all three locations would be necessary. For this to be achieved, I would suggest that such a review would be more effective with input from a professional historian who has a specific interest in and a proven track record of peer-reviewed research in this area.

You will be aware that for some time I have been conducting historical research into the MOD's involvement in 'UFO' matters, as part of my post-doctoral research based at the National Centre for English Cultural Tradition, University of Sheffield. My work has involved a very detailed study of material available at the Public Record Office dating from 1947 to 1972, and more recently via applications to your Secretariat for access to files closed under the current '30 year rule' under the Code of Practice.

My research has now progressed to the stage where I am preparing an application to the Economic and Social Research Council for a funded, two year project. This will propose an extension to my research base, resulting in the production of a detailed study of MOD investigations from 1950 to present. This research would be of interest to MOD both in terms of providing a comprehensive history of its involvement in this area, and as a reference work for use in future years. Furthermore, as the E.S.R.C. operate a joint funding scheme with MOD whereby collaboration is encouraged with research institutions on "defence issues and other areas which may be of interest to the MOD" this underscores the timely nature of my proposal.

My proposal has the support of a number of prominent academics including **Section 40** **Section 40** and **Section 40** **Section 40** who are providing references. In addition, I would point out that MOD assured the Under Secretary of State for Air as long ago as 1970 that "if a major scientific organisation of high standing had strong reasons for obtaining access to our records their application would be considered on its merits." (Head of S4 Air to US of S, 10 February 1970 in PRO AIR 25/1556)

Given MOD's renewed commitment to "reviewing...information we hold to see what material may be made more generally available", I wish to offer assistance in the review and preparation of 'UFO' material for release under the FOIA. This work, including clerical assistance, could be undertaken as part of my funding proposal to E.S.R.C. with no additional cost to MOD.

I hope you will consider this proposal on its merits, and to that end I enclose a formal letter in support from the Director of NATCECT, Dr Joan Beal, at my University.

To whom it may concern:

I can confirm that Dr David Clarke is a post-doctoral researcher based at the National Centre for English Cultural Tradition, University of Sheffield. During the past three years Dr Clarke has been collecting material relating to the social history of the 'UFO phenomenon' in Britain from 1947 to present.

His research has concentrated upon documenting official investigations, drawing upon a wide range of sources including material available at the Public Record Office and other public and private archives.

Dr Clarke is now in the process of preparing an application to the Economic and Social Research Council (E.S.R.C.) for funding to undertake a two-year project to further develop his research.

The E.S.R.C. operates a joint scheme with MOD "designed to stimulate collaboration between research establishments and academic institutes", and notes that where research is concerned with "defence issues and other areas which may be of interest to the MOD, the MOD may be willing to co-fund the project."

The proposed research will document the historical context that has formed the basis for the development of public policy towards the UFO problem from 1950 to present. It will scrutinize the role of the media and other opinion-formers in shaping popular opinion towards 'unidentified flying objects', and discuss how this in turn has influenced public policy adopted by MOD.

I am confident that Dr Clarke's proposal will be of interest to the Ministry of Defence as a historical reference work, given the Ministry's responsibility for answering public and media inquiries relating to this subject.

In order for Dr Clarke to undertake his research, it will be necessary for him to make requests for access to MOD material currently closed under the Public Record Act 1958. It is our understanding that from January 2005 this material will be subject to applications under the Freedom of Information Act, and that prior to implementation you will be reviewing information "to see what material may be made more generally available."

Given this commitment, I hope you will consider a) supporting Dr Clarke's proposal to the E.S.R.C under the joint scheme and/or b) considering Dr Clarke's offer of assistance in the process of processing and cataloguing your archives, as a part of his research proposal.

While we are happy to withhold individuals names (and any unique post identifiers) in accordance with Exemption 12 of the Code (Privacy of an individual) and the Data Protection Act 1998, we do not normally remove references to departments from documents we release. Indeed where appropriate we may even release documents referring to Defence Intelligence branches. Under the Code it is not possible to merely remove details without sighting an Exemption of the Code, and being able to justify this action to the Parliamentary Ombudsman should the requester challenge the decision, something I believe the person requesting this information is likely to do, particularly if he is unable to tell where the documents have come from.

Please could you let me know as soon as possible, the reason for removing these details and what Exemption of the Code you believe these should be withheld under.

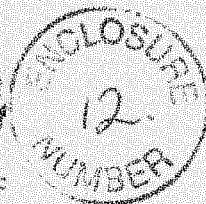
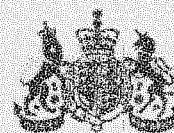

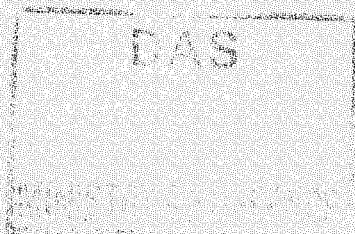

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UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS: UN INITIATIVE BY GRENADA

Problem

1. How to react to further proposals by Grenada, following up their 1977 initiative on UFOs.

Background

- 2. At last year's General Assembly Premier Gairy of Grenada urged the United Nations to establish an agency or working group for research into unidentified flying objects. Mr Luard expressed the view that the proposal would bring the UN into disrepute. Accordingly, the UK delegation was instructed to oppose the draft Grenadan resolution. In the event, no vote was taken on the resolution; as a compromise, the General Assembly "studied the text" and requested the Secretary-General to transmit it to state members of the UN and to interested specialised agencies so that they might communicate their views to the Secretary-General.
- 3. The Secretary-General's subsequent report contained only three replies from Governments, (India, Luxembourg and the Seychelles) and unforthcoming reactions from two specialised agencies.
- 4. The Permanent Mission of Grenada circulated a letter to Permanent Missions in New York on 10 November, which was followed up by a statement to the Special Political Committee on 27 November by the Prime Minister of Grenada, who complicated matters by introducing a new resolution instead of the one previously circulated. Subsequent developments are reported in UKMIS telno 2566 of 27 November.
- 5. The brief for this item is at flag F.

Argument

6. The Grenadan initiative continues to hold no attractions whatsoever for us. It is obvious, however, that some of our Western partners /including

(including the FRG Presidency and the United States) are making an effort to help Grenada off the hook if this can be done without cost to the UN. It must also be said, in fairness, that the Grenadan proposal is no more ridiculous than many other proposals before the UN. Indeed President Carter has in the past reportedly taken a personal interest in the subject of UFOs. The proposal is at least not positively harmful to UK interests, whereas taking too strong and open a stand against Mr Gairy could be. Moreover, if we can help the Grenadans to reach a compromise, it could conceivably help us to persuade them to abstain on the vote on foreign economic and other interests in plenary (the Fourth Committee Resolution which inter alia strongly condemns the UK and others for dealings with South Africa).

Recommendation

7. I recommend that we instruct the Mission to continue to resist the original Grenadan proposal but to give discreet support to efforts by Western or other countries to postpone or reduce the scope and cost of the Grenadan proposal as much as possible. I accordingly submit a draft telegram to UKMIS New York.

8. UND were consulted on UN aspects, and concur.

1. THE TWO MEETINGS IN THE SPC ON THE ABOVE ITEM TODAY FOLLOWED THE SCENARIO OUTLINED IN MY TELEGRAM UNDER REFERENCE, EXCEPT THAT MR GAIRY COMPLICATED MATTERS BY INTRODUCING A NEW RESOLUTION IN HIS OPENING STATEMENT INSTEAD OF THE ONE PREVIOUSLY CIRCULATED TO MISSIONS (MISS HARDEN'S LETTER OF 21 NOVEMBER TO MRS WISEMAN). THE NEW RESOLUTION ELABORATES ON THE IDEA IN THE INDIAN REPLY TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL (A/33/269), PROPOSING INTER ALIA THAT THE SECRETARY-GENERAL SHOULD APPOINT A THREE-MEMBER GROUP OF EXPERTS MEETING UNDER THE AEGIS OF THE OUTER SPACE COMMITTEE AND REPORTING THROUGH THAT COMMITTEE TO THE 34TH SESSION. (TEXT IN MIFT).
2. THERE HAD BEEN NO PRIOR WARNING THAT THE GRENADANS INTENDED TABLING A NEW RESOLUTION TODAY AND MEMBERS OF THE OUTER SPACE COMMITTEE, PARTICULARLY THE AUSTRIAN CHAIRMAN WHO HAD NOT BEEN CONSULTED, WERE STRONGLY OPPOSED TO THIS FURTHER ATTEMPT TO INVOLVE THE OUTER SPACE COMMITTEE IN THE SUBJECT OF UFOS. THE AUSTRIANS, AMONG OTHERS, PRIVATELY INTIMATED THEIR DISMAY TO THE GRENADAN MISSION, WHO BY THE END OF THE AFTERNOON MEETING GAVE SIGNS OF REGRETTING THEIR PRECIPITANCE. BEFORE THE CHAIRMAN CLOSED THE MEETING FRIDAY (MINISTER OF EDUCATION) INTERVENED TO SAY THAT THE GRENADANS WERE FLEXIBLE ABOUT THEIR DRAFT RESOLUTION AND INVITED DELEGATIONS TO CONVEY ANY SUGGESTIONS THEY MIGHT HAVE TO THE GRENADAN MISSION PENDING RESUMPTION OF DISCUSSION OF THE ITEM AT A LATER DATE.

3. THIS WILL ALLOW TIME TO WORK OUT AN ALTERNATIVE PROPOSAL. THE GERMANS, WITH AUSTRIAN BACKING, FAVOUR A GROUP OF EXPERTS TO BE APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNMENT OF GRENADA, WHICH MIGHT IN DUE COURSE REPORT ITS FINDINGS TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL. THE US MISSION, WHEN MR GAIRY CALLED ON THEM ON 24 NOVEMBER, FLOATED THE IDEA OF A SPECIAL RAPPORTEUR (TO BE FINANCED BY THE GOVERNMENT OF GRENADA) WHO WOULD STUDY THE PROBLEM AND REPORT BACK TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL. It is possible however that it will acquire support as a fallback position which the majority will be prepared to go along with to save Grenada's face. We will keep in close touch with our allies.

The General Assembly,

Mindful of its commitment to promote international co-operation in solving international problems,

Aware of the growing interest taken by people of the world in Unidentified Flying Objects and related Phenomena which continue to baffle mankind, and in strange happenings in various parts of the world.....

Noting the statement made by the Prime Minister of Grenada at the 30th, 31st, 32nd, and 33rd Session of the General Assembly regarding these baffling phenomena, and his appeal to have the United Nations conduct and co-ordinate research into Unidentified Flying Objects and related phenomena and to disseminate more widely among the Nations of the world information and other data gathered.

Recognising the commitment to research into these phenomena demonstrated by individual scientists, researchers, educational institutions and National Governments.

1. Recommends that there be initiated a special official United Nations study on the nature and relationship of Unidentified Flying Objects and extra-terrestrial phenomena.
2. Requests The Secretary-General to appoint at the earliest possible date an "ad hoc group of experts" of not more than seven (7) scientific experts drawn from within the United Nations Secretariat and from private research organisations with the task of elaborating a possible framework for the above-mentioned study.
3. Further requests the Secretary-General to make available to the ad hoc group of experts all the relevant material, including proposals made by Member States as well as previous and current studies available on the subject.
4. Further requests the Committee to submit a preliminary report on its work by June 1, 1979.
5. Further requests the Secretary-General to transmit the preliminary report of the ad hoc group of experts to Member States not later than July 30th, 1979.
6. Decides to include in the provisional agenda of the Thirty Fourth Session of the General Assembly the item entitled "Report of the ad hoc group of experts" to investigate the nature and relationship of Unidentified Flying Objects and extra-terrestrial phenomena.
7. Decides further that a comprehensive report of the committee will be tabled at the 35th Regular Session of the General Assembly.

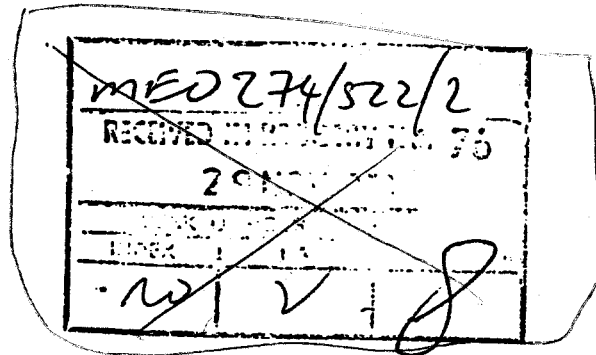

The attached brief has been prepared by the Energy Science and Space Department in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in consultation with Department of Industry and the Home Office. A UK AIMS

To oppose the establishment of any such agency.

B POINTS TO MAKE

2. The British delegation does not think that the establishment of an agency for research into unidentified flying objects is appropriate to the functions of the United Nations. It considers that the existence of such an agency under UN auspices would be an unjustifiable drain on UN resources which could be better deployed elsewhere.

C TACTICS

3. Hopefully a confrontation with the representative of Grenada can be avoided, but the UK should not hesitate to make its views known as and when appropriate. You should seek whatever support you can particularly among the Nine.

BACKGROUND

4. At last year's UN General Assembly, the Grenadan delegation, with the full support of Premier Gairy, sought to establish an ad hoc working group of the UN to evaluate UFO reports. FCO Ministers expressed the view that to set up any such body would reduce the credibility of the UN; accordingly the UK delegation was instructed to oppose. In the event, no vote was taken on the Grenadan Resolution; as a compromise, the General Assembly "studied the text" and requested the Secretary-General to transmit it "to states members of the UN and to interested specialised agencies so that they might communicate their views to the Secretary-General".

UFO ITEM.

1. WE REMAIN FIRMLY OPPOSED TO A GRENADA RESOLUTION ON UFOS. WE DO NOT CONSIDER SUCH OPPOSITION LIKELY TO BE DAMAGING EITHER TO THE UK OR TO THE UN. YOU SHOULD, THEREFORE, MAKE NO ATTEMPT TO CONCEAL THE UK'S INTENTION OF VOTING AGAINST ANY RESOLUTION CONTAINING AN OPERATIONAL OUTCOME, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER OR NOT THIS LEAVES US IN A MINORITY.

2. IF THE GRENADANS CAN BE PERSUADED TO ABANDON THEIR RESOLUTION WE THINK THAT REFERRAL OF THEIR UFO INTEREST TO THE COMMITTEE ON OUTER SPACE WOULD PROVIDE THE BEST FACE SAVING DEVICE. THIS COMMITTEE IS AFTER ALL THE ESTABLISHED UN BODY DEALING WITH OUTER SPACE MATTERS. WE UNDERSTAND THE AUSTRIAN CHAIRMAN'S ANXIETIES BUT THINK THAT IN VIEW OF THE COMMITTEE'S EXISTING WORK LOAD, THIS ITSELF SHOULD BE A REASONABLE GUARANTEE THAT THE UFO ISSUE WOULD BE PLACED AT THE BOTTOM OF ITS AGENDA WITH A FAIR CHANCE OF BEING IGNORED INDEFINITELY.

3. WE ARE LESS ATTRACTED TO THE SUGGESTION IN PARAGRAPH 6 OF TELNO. 2241. IT HAS THE DISADVANTAGE THAT ONCE THE UFO ISSUE WAS INSCRIBED AS AN AGENDA ITEM FOR THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY IT WOULD BE THERE IN BLACK AND WHITE AND WE COULD NOT REPEAT NOT BE CERTAIN THAT CONTINUING PRESSURE FROM GRENADA, PERHAPS WITH THE SUPPORT OF OTHER DELEGATIONS, WOULD NOT LEAD TO ITS DISCUSSION EITHER AT THE 33RD OR 34TH SESSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

AGENDA ITEM 126: ESTABLISHMENT OF AN AGENCY OR A DEPARTMENT OF THE UNITED NATIONS FOR UNDERTAKING, CO-ORDINATING AND DISSEMINATING THE RESULTS OF RESEARCH INTO UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS AND RELATED PHENOMENA (continued) (A/33/141, A/33/268; A/SPC/33/L.20)

1. Mr. FRIDAY (Grenada)* read out a letter from L. Gordon Cooper, a former astronaut, expressing the belief that unidentified flying objects were extraterrestrial vehicles whose crews were visiting Earth from more technically advanced planets. Mr. Cooper had himself spent two days in 1951 observing UFOs of different sizes flying in fighter formation, generally from east to west over Europe. A top-level co-ordinated programme was needed to collect and analyse data from all over the world concerning all types of encounters and to determine how best to make friendly contact with such visitors. Man might have to prove to the visitors that he had learned to solve his problems by peaceful means rather than by warfare before he could be accepted as a fully qualified universal team member. Such acceptance would have tremendous possibilities for the advancement of the world in all areas, and it would certainly seem that the United Nations had an interest in handling the subject properly and expeditiously. If the United Nations agreed to pursue the project, many more well-qualified people might agree to provide help and information.
2. Mr. FRIEDMAN (Grenada)* said it was important to remember that men throughout the world had something in common: they were all earthlings, a fact which tended to be forgotten when man's many differences were aired. After 20 years of study, he believed that there was overwhelming evidence to suggest that the planet was being visited by intelligently controlled extraterrestrial vehicles. The evidence took the form of eye-witness testimony from responsible persons, physical trace cases producing changes in the environment observable long after the UFO had left, radar visual sightings, photographs and abductions, apparently by aliens of earthlings and the subsequent return of the earthlings, although there was no knowledge of cases where earthlings had not been returned.
3. Every large-scale scientific study of UFOs had provided a substantial number of cases in which the observations clearly indicated that the UFO was a manufactured object behaving in ways which could not be duplicated by manufactured objects on Earth. The ability of UFOs to move and manoeuvre at thousands of miles an hour, without any visible external engine, wings or tail, indicated that the spacecraft had been manufactured by someone other than man. Many people wished to know why UFOs should visit Earth and what was happening on Earth that could be of interest to an advanced civilization. Probably there were many things of interest to someone concerned with the development of a primitive society. However, one thing was guaranteed to be of interest to another civilization and that was the fact that within one hundred years men would be going to the stars. He himself, as a nuclear physicist, had worked on fission and fusion propulsion systems which would be capable of transporting man to nearby star systems within reasonable periods of time, and it would be obvious to any alien in the neighbourhood that man would be doing so within a hundred years. Since the end of the Second World War, with the development

of nuclear weapons, rockets and electronics, man had become of interest to other, advanced civilizations. Naturally, such civilizations would be concerned with their own survival and security and would therefore wish to be informed of the activities of another civilization which was just beginning space travel; it was therefore clear that the UFOs were obtaining data for their own purposes, acting as a kind of galactic federation intelligence agency.

4. People also wondered why UFOs did not make contact. He suggested that there was no one leader with whom such alien beings could make contact. Whereas the smallest reasonable political unit on a galactic neighbourhood basis was a planet or a solar system, from the alien viewpoint man's was a primitive society whose major activity was tribal warfare; it would make no more sense for alien beings to speak to individual countries than for the United Nations to address individual cities.

5. Some people were worried at the significance of flying saucers and wondered why, in the light of the importance of questions of peace, survival and hunger, people should concern themselves with such matters. He suggested that man's very survival might depend on his taking an earthling orientation. The easiest way of doing so was for him to try to see himself as others saw him. From up above, coming into the planet Earth, there were no boundary lines. Acceptance of oneself as an earthling would become natural when it was recognized that the planet Earth was being visited.

6. There were also practical aspects such as the significance of man's acquiring motive propulsion which would enable him to travel and to transport goods from place to place without using the traditional means of transport and without expending valuable resources which were normally burned and thrown away. It was clear that aliens had solved problems such as the development of new and better means of producing energy. In addition, the Earth might well have some resources which could be exported to alien civilizations; as the densest planet in the solar system, the Earth had more valuable heavy metals than any other planet in the neighbourhood and might also have plant life and other materials which would be of interest to aliens.

7. Modern astronomy frequently assumed, in relation to the possibility of contact with extraterrestrial intelligences, that all other solar systems were isolated in the same manner as our own, in which the nearest star to the sun was four light years away. However, within our own galactic neighbourhood there were approximately 1,000 stars, of which 46 were similar to the sun and might well be expected to have planets and life; some of those planets would be much older than Earth. In addition, research into UFOs had revealed the existence of two sun-like stars, Zeta I Reticulae and Zeta II Reticulae, which were separated by only three light weeks; such close proximity would suggest that interstellar travel and communication might have been developed much earlier than on our isolated planet. Three recent professional publications had expressed the view that our entire galaxy had probably already been colonized. Perhaps the most important thing to recognize was that the next generation would grow up in a drastically different situation; unless something was done to prevent it, another dozen countries would soon have nuclear weapons and the world would be further divided into groups instead of becoming the earthling civilization which was necessary for its survival.

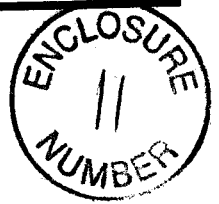

8. Mr. FRIDAY (Grenada) invited members of the Committee to make suggestions and recommendations concerning the draft resolution submitted by his delegation (A/SPC/33/L.20); his delegation was very flexible as to the actual mechanism to be decided on by the Committee for monitoring and co-ordinating research into UFOs and would be interested to hear the ideas of other delegations on the matter. He assumed that the vote on the resolution would take place at a later date.
9. The CHAIRMAN said that the substantive consideration of and vote on the resolution would be deferred until a later meeting.
10. Mr. TUBMAN (Liberia) requested that the statements made by the members of the delegation of Grenada should be reproduced in extenso in the records so that delegates could study them more closely.
11. The CHAIRMAN recalled that the General Assembly, at the 4th plenary meeting of its current session, had decided to maintain the option that had traditionally been approved for the Special Political Committee to obtain transcriptions of debates of some of its meetings, or portions thereof.
12. Miss HARDEN (United Kingdom) asked what the financial implications of such action would be.
13. The CHAIRMAN said that such expenditure as might be incurred by the provision of transcriptions of the Committee's debates was considered to be part of the normal work of the General Assembly; there were no direct financial implications. If he heard no objection, he would take it that the Committee approved the request made by the representative of Liberia.
14. It was so decided.

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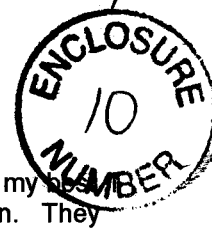

If there are particular concerns about these documents or you are having to consult others outside the FCO, please let me know.

Thank you for your letter of 3 January, with which you enclosed a cheque for £260 for the papers sent to you on the 9 December 2002. Please find enclosed a receipt as requested.

With regard to your further points, I will address these in the same order as your letter.

1. We are still awaiting advice on the release of papers from file DS8/75/3 Part A. I apologise for the delay. As soon as I have a decision, I will write to you. If cleared for release, we will, of course, send you copies of these papers.
2. We have no record of file S4/4/8/1 amongst our records of surviving 'UFO' files. However, as the document mentioned consultation with DI54 I ask DI staff to search their archives and the enclosed documents have been located which seem to be relevant to your enquiry. Personal details have been removed. I have also removed part of paragraph 5, lines 7 to 9 of the loose minute to Head of DI54 dated 13 December 1977. This is because it contains information contained in the documents mentioned in paragraph 1 which have not yet been released. If this information is released to you at a later date, I will also send you another copy of this document. The original letter from the clergyman was not on the file, but we are making further enquiries to see if it can be located. I will let you know the outcome of these enquiries as soon as possible. I have also checked with our archives to see if they hold any files with the references D/S4(Air)8/2/1C, (mentioned in these papers), S4/4/8/1 or S4(Air)4/8/1, but they been unable to locate any such surviving files.
3. The papers sent to you from file D/Sec(AS)12/7 were as requested, copies of reports and the assessment made. I can confirm that **Section 40** report was not seen by ACAS. The Head of Sec(AS) wrote to ACAS to advise him of these events because around that time there had been speculation in the media and a parliamentary question by Lord Kennet asking whether USAF experimental aircraft had been authorised to fly over the UK. ACAS noted this, but had nothing to add.
4. The file D/Sec(AS)64/2 does contain a copy of the MPs letter to the Department and we are currently taking advice about its release. I will write to you again as soon as possible regarding this matter.

5. You asked how requests for information will be handled when the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) gains full public access in January 2005. Work is currently underway on the processes to be used when answering Requests for Information (RFI) under the FOIA. Each request will be dealt with on a case by case basis. Where requests are broad or vague, it is likely that individuals will be asked to be more specific about the information required in order to reduce costs. With regard to fees, the Act states that the maximum fee shall not exceed 10% of the prescribed cost and the disbursements. These include locating and retrieving the information, and the direct costs of communicating it to the individual concerned. Where the prescribed costs exceed £600 the Department is not obliged to comply with the request.

6. Finally, you mentioned the future of UFO records that are less than 30 years old. As you rightly state, many of the files we hold contain the personal details of those who have either reported their sightings to us, or have corresponded with the MOD and to protect their privacy these details would have to be removed before the papers could be released. However, in the remaining time before full implementation of the Act we will be reviewing the information we hold to see what material may be made more generally available via the MOD Freedom of Information Publication Scheme. This Scheme was launched on 29 November 2002 as the first step towards the introduction of the FOIA and can be found at www.foi.mod.uk.

7. I hope this helpful.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

1. You asked me to comment on loose minute DCDS(I)/52 dated 9 December 1977. As you know, S4(Air) are responsible for answering public enquiries and for briefing Ministers on MPs' questions about UFOs. I attach our stock reply which has been endorsed by successive Ministers *and which, if you agree, might serve as the basis of the reply to CBS's correspondent.*
2. So far as I know there has been no British Scientific enquiry into the possible existence of UFOs, nor is there evidence that MOD has taken the question very seriously. However, we have kept in touch with the United States Air Force who made a systematic, if protracted, attempt to record and investigate UFO sightings from 1952 to 1968. The USAF enquiry, known as Project Blue Book, was followed by a study which was originally suggested by a member of a congressional investigation in the Armed Forces Committee and which was assigned by the Air Force Office of Scientific Research to the University of Colorado. It was led by Dr Edward V Condon, Professor of Physics and formerly Director of the National Bureau of Standards. This is the enquiry referred to in the attached brief and, as stated there, it was endorsed in 1969 by the National Academy of Sciences who concluded that there was no scientific or military justification for further study of UFOs, that the reports of UFOs up to that time posed no threat to national security and that continuance of the Blue Book Project was of doubtful value. The Condon report caused a good deal of controversy and, I believe, was much criticised. However, when I consulted the RAF Staff in Washington about this they assured me in August 1976 that HQ USAF saw no likelihood of their further involvement in this area. The USAF pointed to the considerable Air Force commitment of resources in the past, the extreme pressure on Air Force funds in 1976 and the fact that since 1969 no evidence had been presented to warrant further investigation.
3. It is always possible of course, that the considerable correspondence addressed to MOD might contain some hint, not of UFOs, but of something with a hostile terrestrial origin which could have a bearing on national security. We have therefore been careful to refer all UFO enquiries from the public to ADI55 and DD Ops (GE)(RAF) for any further investigation which they might consider to be justified. As a Secretariat branch, S4(Air) does not need to know about this type of enquiry and we do not ask for further information; we tell the public flatly that we cannot enter into detailed correspondence, and enquiries are not necessarily made to the point of positive identification. The only exception to this is the occasional case where a Member of Parliament shows exceptional interest or concern and we seek ADI 55's advice so that the Minister can reply more fully and specifically than the standard draft allows.
4. That is all there really is to the MOD UFO "policy" except that we do not publish the correspondence from the public. The only reason for that is lack of staff; we would have to obliterate the identities of our many correspondents, and possibly occasional references to classified subjects, and there is no one we can spare for the job.

5. As it happens, however, I was about to seek confirmation of the general line we take even before you consulted me on the letter sent to CDS. There is always a steady public interest in UFOs and from time to time it tends to increase unaccountably. There was a sustained flurry in the 1960s which was sufficient to embroil my predecessor in a BBC TV programme. Last summer there was some concern in Wales although the RAF Police thought this could have been the work of a practical joker. In the last few weeks the [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] and he has also had discussions with Mr Jimmy Carter whom the Press have connected with UFOs in the past. Then a few days ago the Earl of Glancarty put down a number of questions in the House of Lords referring to UFO investigations allegedly under way in France and a broadcast said to have been made in 1974 by the Contemporary French Minister of Defence. (See Hansard extracts attached).

6. We believe that [REDACTED] is a Vice President of the British UFO Research Association. I should add that we were unable to verify the alleged Ministerial broadcast when a member of the public told us in 1976 that in it the French had admitted the existence of flying saucers. The British Air Attache in Paris did find out however that the French operate a procedure under which UFO reports from the public go in the first instance to the French Defence Ministry (Air) who study the military implications and finally to a Government organisation known as the Centre Nationale D'Etude Spatial where the reports are considered by scientists. The reports are also fed into a computer where they are "added to the statistics of the problem". We were advised that the French military authorities had found nothing of an aggressive nature in the sightings although their scientists had been unable to explain the phenomena. As this information came to us by telephone I have now written to the Air Attache to document it and up date it in the light of the Earl of Glancarty's questions.

7. One way and another there could be renewed interest in UFOs in the next few months and I have already been asked to take stock of our current policy. The basic questions are: -

- a. Should we take flying saucers seriously?
- b. Is the general MOD policy valid (as outlined in the attached brief and as supplemented above)?
- c. Is it correct to confine MOD investigations to the defence implications of alleged UFO sightings - should the investigations be extended either in the interest of national defence or more widely into the more speculative field concerning the possible existence of extra terrestrial vehicles?
- d. Should MOD take the public more seriously and, for example, visit the places where sightings have been reported (a line of enquiry; I might add which could not be undertaken by S4(Air)'s slender establishment)?

8. I should be most grateful if you would seek the views of DSTI and Air Cdre (Int) whom I believe you will be consulting before reporting to CDS.

The report caused a good deal of controversy and, I believe, was much criticised. However, when the RAF staff in Washington was consulted in April 1976 about this they assured MOD that HQ USAF saw no likelihood of their further involvement in this area. The USAF pointed to the considerable Air Force commitment of resources in the past, the extreme pressure on Air Force funds in 1976 and the fact that since 1969 no evidence had been presented to warrant further investigation.
3. It is always possible, of course, that the considerable correspondence addressed to MOD (and dealt with by S4(Air)) might contain some hint, not of UFOs, but of something with a hostile terrestrial origin which could have a bearing on national security. All UFO enquiries from the public are therefore referred by S4(Air) to

ADI DI 55 and DD Ops(GE)(RAF) for any further investigation which they might consider to be justified.

4. I attach at Annex A a draft reply which you may wish to send in response to paras 3(a)(b) of the Rev [REDACTED] letter.

DRAFT REPLY TO LETTER FROM THE REV [REDACTED]

1. An MOD study of the scientific significance of UFO's has not been carried out since our interest is limited to the defence aspects. We receive UFO reports from members of the public, the police and Service units and our sole aim is to establish any possible defence implications. We have not the resources to undertake the investigation to the point of positive correlation with a known object and there is no organisation appointed for the study of UFOs, per se. UFO reports are examined by various specialist staff within the Ministry of Defence as part of their normal staff responsibilities. They can call on the full scientific and professional resources of the Department and if necessary may call on the expert advice of other Government and non-Government bodies.
2. Simple explanations have been found for the great majority of UFO reports, the most common single source being aircraft or the lights of aircraft seen under unusual conditions. Other common explanations are astronomical sightings, space satellites or space junk, balloons, unusual cloud formations or aircraft condensation trails. Unexplained reports have often been found to be imprecise or lacking in some essential data, but otherwise to have been no different in kind from other reports.
3. I am of course aware of work that has been done elsewhere, in particular the studies of the University of Colorado, whose main findings were endorsed by a panel of the US National Academy of Sciences. The conclusions the panel came to were:
 - a) about 90% of all UFO reports proved to be quite plausibly related to ordinary phenomena;
 - b) little, if anything, had come from the study of UFOs during 21 years that added to scientific knowledge;

- c) further extensive study of UFO sightings was not justified in the expectation that science would be advanced thereby;
- d) no evidence had come to light that UFO sightings might represent a defence hazard.

4. Although I would not dismiss the possibility that intelligent life may exist in outer space, the UFO reports that have reached the MOD to date contain no evidence to support this hypothesis. The conclusions of the American work are persuasive and I would not disagree with any of their findings.

The conclusions the panel came to were:

3. Reports of UFOs are not in themselves regarded by the Department as necessarily classified material; ~~reports are, however,~~ in common with all correspondence received from the general public, ^{the reports are} treated as confidential and are closed to public scrutiny until such time as they would become available in accordance with the Public Records Act ie at the end of 30 years. However, ~~No~~ reports earlier than 1962 are held in the Department.

4. ~~Finally,~~ The Ministry of Defence does not dismiss the possibility that intelligent life could exist in outer space. However, the UFO reports that have reached the Department to date contain no evidence to support this hypothesis.

Lord WINTERBOTTOM: The Government have no record of a statement made in February 1974 by the then French Minister of Defence.

Our Ministry of Defence has no specific organisation engaged on the examination of reports of unidentified flying objects; reports are examined by specialist staffs as part of their normal duties to see if they contain any implications for the defence of the United Kingdom. Investigations into any scientific significance of phenomena

ROAD SIGNS

Lord DE CLIFFORD asked Her Majesty's Government:

What information the large yellow backed road signs exhibiting black triangles, diamonds, circles and squares now proliferating in the West Midlands meant to convey to the motorist; and whether they will be included in the new *Highway Code* for everyone's information.

Baroness STEDMAN: These new signs mark routes for traffic to follow when some emergency requires a section of motorway to be closed. They guide drivers from the motorway and back to it beyond the point of closure. Because the signs are at present individually authorised for each route and have not yet been prescribed in regulations for general use, they are not being included in the new *Highway Code*; but they have received press publicity and an explanatory leaflet has been produced for distribution to drivers. I shall be sending the noble Lord a copy of the leaflet and copies have been placed in the Library.

(4) No information is readily available about the average time spent in custody prior to deportation by persons who had not been imprisoned for a criminal offence.

(5) The longest period for which such a person in custody on 31st October 1977 had been held under the 1971 Act awaiting deportation was 301 days.

(6) There is considerable variation in the circumstances of those held to await deportation after serving custodial sentences. - (d) to arrange bail securities,
- (e) to contact a national representative at an Embassy etc.

(8) A request for assistance for a visit to a detainee would be considered on the same basis as for a visit to a remand prisoner.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

The Earl of CLANCARTY asked Her Majesty's Government:

Whether they are aware that Monsieur Robert Galley, the then French Minister of Defence, in his radio interview on the France-Inter radio on 21st February 1974 stated that the gendarmerie are playing a very large part in official investigations into unidentified flying object sightings and alleged landings; and whether our police have been likewise officially

instructed to collect reports and investigate these unidentified flying objects.

Lord HARRIS of GREENWICH: The Government has no knowledge of either the radio interview to which the Question refers, or the role played by the gendarmerie in investigating unidentified flying objects. The police in this country have not been asked to collect reports of, or investigate, unidentified flying objects. The jurisdiction and powers of the police are normally confined to terrestrial activities, but I have every confidence that should an occasion arise where there is evidence that an unidentified flying object has landed within a police area, the police force concerned will investigate it with its customary vigour. However, until there is some clear indication that the frequency of such occurrences is likely to impose a significant burden on the police, I doubt whether it would prove fruitful to issue guidance on this subject.

" A STUDY OF EXMOOR "

Lord NORTHFIELD asked Her Majesty's Government:

Whether they will make a Statement on Lord Porchester's Report *A Study of Exmoor*.

Baroness STEDMAN: As the House was informed on 6th April last, my right honourable friends the Secretary of State for the Environment and the Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food appointed Lord Porchester to undertake a study of changes in the moorland areas of the Exmoor National Park, because they felt that the exceptional character of the moor as a national heritage and the need to balance and safeguard the various interests concerned called for special and immediate study.

My right honourable friends are greatly indebted to Lord Porchester for the fair and expeditious way in which he has conducted the Survey and prepared his report. This was published yesterday and copies are available in the Printed Paper Office.

The report establishes that since 1947 the total area of moorland in the National Park has been reduced by some 12,000 acres. Within the Critical Amenity Area

countries. She has extended and expanded in the best possible way our whole approach to aid, and I should like it made absolutely clear that that is what we meant.

I should like to give the noble Lord another quotation from his article. He said that in this particular project the Government's case was based on "less elevated political motives". In answer to this I should like to give one quotation from a recent article of my right honourable friend. It is this:

"... we all need to take into account human rights, whether it be Cambodia or Uganda, Indonesia, Chile, or Bolivia, Czechoslovakia or the Soviet Union".

I am most grateful for the support I have received tonight from my two noble friends—indeed a powerful and impressive combination, and from the noble Lord, Lord Avebury, in another powerful contribution. I think now that on the question of aid for Bolivia we must look to the future. We shall not go back on our decision about the tin mining project. As I have said, our offer of assistance has been welcomed, and our commitment to help when we can find the right projects is a firm one. The Government's reasons for deciding against the mining projects are good ones. They are perfectly well understood by the Bolivian Government, and we look forward to mutually satisfactory relations over new projects.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

The Earl of CLANCARTY asked Her Majesty's Government:

Whether they are aware that in France, since 1st September 1977, a section for the study of unidentified flying objects has been set up in the National Centre for Space Studies in Toulouse, under the direction of Monsieur Claude Poher, a distinguished scientist, and that this body is sponsored upon the French Ministry of Industry and Research; and whether there is a similar scientific organisation under Government sponsorship in the United Kingdom to study unidentified flying

objects, working closely with the French one.

The MINISTER of STATE, DEPARTMENT of EDUCATION and SCIENCE (Lord Donaldson of Kingsbridge): Her Majesty's Government understand that a study group called the Groupe d'Etudes sur les Phenomenes Aerospaciales Non-Identifies (GEPAN) has been set up under the French Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Artisans at the National Centre for Space Studies in Toulouse. The group has no formal links with the United Kingdom, and we have no similar scientific group to study unidentified objects or phenomena.

Whether they will list in the *Official Report* the number of applications for legal aid which have been refused for each year since 1970 and whether they will classify this information according to the following categories:

- (a) where the Supplementary Benefits Commission have determined the applicant's disposable income at an amount greater than the limit;
- (b) where the Supplementary Benefits Commission have determined the applicant's disposable capital at an amount greater than the limit;
- (c) where the proceedings to which the application related are not proceedings for which legal aid may be given;
- (d) where the applicant has not shown that he has reasonable grounds for taking, defending, or being a party to the proceedings;
- (e) where it appears unreasonable that the applicant should receive legal aid in the particular circumstances of the case.

The LORD CHANCELLOR: The available information is set out below in two tables. No information is available about category (c) and combined figures only are available for categories (a) and (b). In England and Wales combined figures only are available for categories (d) and (e).

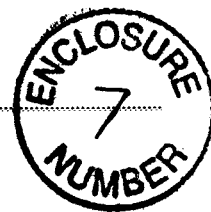

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

1. You asked me to comment on loose minute DCDS(I)/52 dated 9 December 1977. As you know, S4(Air) are responsible for answering public enquiries and for briefing Ministers on MPs' questions about UFOs. I attach our stock reply which has been endorsed by successive Ministers *and which, if you agree, might serve as the basis of the reply to CDS's Correspondent.*
2. So far as I know there has been no British Scientific enquiry into the possible existence of UFOs, nor is there evidence that MOD has taken the question very seriously. However, we have kept in touch with the United States Air Force who made a systematic, if protracted, attempt to record and investigate UFO sightings from 1952 to 1968. The USAF enquiry, known as Project Blue Book, was followed by a study which was originally suggested by a member of a congressional investigation in the Armed Forces Committee and which was assigned by the Air Force Office of Scientific Research to the University of Colorado. It was led by Dr Edward V Condon, Professor of Physics and formerly Director of the National Bureau of Standards. This is the enquiry referred to in the attached brief and, as stated there, it was endorsed in 1969 by the National Academy of Sciences who concluded that there was no scientific or military justification for further study of UFOs, that the reports of UFOs up to that time posed no threat to national security and that continuance of the Blue Book Project was of doubtful value. The Condon report caused a good deal of controversy and, I believe, was much criticised. However, when I consulted the RAF Staff in Washington about this they assured me in August 1976 that HQ USAF saw no likelihood of their further involvement in this area. The USAF pointed to the considerable Air Force commitment of resources in the past, the extreme pressure on Air Force funds in 1976 and the fact that since 1969 no evidence had been presented to warrant further investigation.
3. It is always possible of course, that the considerable correspondence addressed to MOD might contain some hint, not of UFOs, but of something with a hostile terrestrial origin which could have a bearing on national security. We have therefore been careful to refer all UFO enquiries from the public to ADI55 and DD Ops (GE)(RAF) for any further investigation which they might consider to be justified. As a Secretariat branch, S4(Air) does not need to know about this type of enquiry and we do not ask for further information; we tell the public flatly that we cannot enter into detailed correspondence, and enquiries are not necessarily made to the point of positive identification. The only exception to this is the occasional case where a Member of Parliament shows exceptional interest or concern and we seek ADI 55's advice so that the Minister can reply more fully and specifically than the standard draft allows.
4. That is all there really is to the MOD UFO "policy" except that we do not publish the correspondence from the public. The only reason for that is lack of staff; we would have to obliterate the identities of our many correspondents, and possibly occasional references to classified subjects, and there is no one we can spare for the job.

5. As it happens, however, I was about to seek confirmation of the general line we take even before you consulted me on the letter sent to CDS. There is always a steady public interest in UFOs and from time to time it tends to increase unaccountably. There was a sustained flurry in the 1960s which was sufficient to embroil my predecessor in a BBC TV programme. Last summer there was some concern in Wales although the RAF Police thought this could have been the work of a practical joker. In the last few weeks the Prime Minister of Grenada has secured a UFO debate at the United Nations (which could conceivably involve the Foreign Office and No 10 in correspondence) and he has also had discussions with Mr Jimmy Carter whom the Press have connected with UFOs in the past. Then a few days ago the Earl of Glancarty put down a number of questions in the House of Lords referring to UFO investigations allegedly under way in France and a broadcast said to have been made in 1974 by the Contemporary French Minister of Defence. (See Hansard extracts attached).

6. We believe that the Earl's half brother and heir, the Hon Brinsley Le Poer French, is a Vice President of the British UFO Research Association. I should add that we were unable to verify the alleged Ministerial broadcast when a member of the public told us in 1976 that in it the French had admitted the existence of flying saucers. The British Air Attache in Paris did find out however that the French operate a procedure under which UFO reports from the public go in the first instance to the French Defence Ministry (Air) who study the military implications and finally to a Government organisation known as the Centre Nationale D'Etude Spatial where the reports are considered by scientists. The reports are also fed into a computer where they are "added to the statistics of the problem". We were advised that the French military authorities had found nothing of an aggressive nature in the sightings although their scientists had been unable to explain the phenomena. As this information came to us by telephone I have now written to the Air Attache to document it and up date it in the light of the Earl of Glancarty's questions.

7. One way and another there could be renewed interest in UFOs in the next few months and I have already been asked to take stock of our current policy. The basic questions are: -

- a. Should we take flying saucers seriously?
- b. Is the general MOD policy valid (as outlined in the attached brief and as supplemented above)?
- c. Is it correct to confine MOD investigations to the defence implications of alleged UFO sightings - should the investigations be extended either in the interest of national defence or more widely into the more speculative field concerning the possible existence of extra terrestrial vehicles?
- d. Should MOD take the public more seriously and, for example, visit the places where sightings have been reported (a line of enquiry; I might add which could not be undertaken by S4(Air)'s slender establishment)?

8. I should be most grateful if you would seek the views of DSTI and Air Cdre (Int) whom I believe you will be consulting before reporting to CDS.

1. An MOD study of the scientific significance of UFO's has not been carried out since our interest is limited to the defence aspects. We receive UFO reports from members of the public, the police and Service units and our sole aim is to establish any possible defence implications. We have not the resources to undertake the investigation to the point of positive correlation with a known object and there is no organisation appointed for the study of UFOs, per se. UFO reports are examined by various specialist staff within the Ministry of Defence as part of their normal staff responsibilities. They can call on the full scientific and professional resources of the Department and if necessary may call on the expert advice of other Government and non-Government bodies.

2. Simple explanations have been found for the great majority of UFO reports, the most common single source being aircraft or the lights of aircraft seen under unusual conditions. Other common explanations are astronomical sightings, space satellites or space junk, balloons, unusual cloud formations or aircraft condensation trails. Unexplained reports have often been found to be imprecise or lacking in some essential data, but otherwise to have been no different in kind from other reports.

3. I am of course aware of work that has been done elsewhere, in particular the studies of the University of Colorado, whose main findings were endorsed by a panel of the US National Academy of Sciences. The conclusions the panel came to were:

- a) about 90% of all UFO reports proved to be quite plausibly related to ordinary phenomena;
- b) little, if anything, had come from the study of UFOs during 21 years that added to scientific knowledge;

ROAD SIGNS

Lord DE CLIFFORD asked Her Majesty's Government:

What information the large yellow backed road signs exhibiting black triangles, diamonds, circles and squares now proliferating in the West Midlands meant to convey to the motorist; and whether they will be included in the new *Highway Code* for everyone's information.

Baroness STEDMAN: These new signs mark routes for traffic to follow when some emergency requires a section of motorway to be closed. They guide drivers from the motorway and back to it beyond the point of closure. Because the signs are at present individually authorised for each route and have not yet been prescribed in regulations for general use, they are not being included in the new *Highway Code*; but they have received press publicity and an explanatory leaflet has been produced for distribution to drivers. I shall be sending the noble Lord a copy of the leaflet and copies have been placed in the Library.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

The Earl of CLANCARTY asked Her Majesty's Government:

Whether they are aware that Monsieur Robert Galley, the then French Minister of Defence, in his radio interview on the France-Inter radio on 21st February 1974 stated that the gendarmerie are playing a very large part in official investigations into unidentified flying object sightings and alleged landings; and whether our police have been likewise officially

instructed to collect reports and investigate these unidentified flying objects.

Lord HARRIS of GREENWICH: The Government has no knowledge of either the radio interview to which the Question refers, or the role played by the gendarmerie in investigating unidentified flying objects. The police in this country have not been asked to collect reports of, or investigate, unidentified flying objects. The jurisdiction and powers of the police are normally confined to terrestrial activities, but I have every confidence that should an occasion arise where there is evidence that an unidentified flying object has landed within a police area, the police force concerned will investigate it with its customary vigour. However, until there is some clear indication that the frequency of such occurrences is likely to impose a significant burden on the police, I doubt whether it would prove fruitful to issue guidance on this subject.

" A STUDY OF EXMOOR "

Lord NORTHFIELD asked Her Majesty's Government:

Whether they will make a Statement on Lord Porchester's Report *A Study of Exmoor*.

Baroness STEDMAN: As the House was informed on 6th April last, my right honourable friends the Secretary of State for the Environment and the Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food appointed Lord Porchester to undertake a study of changes in the moorland areas of the Exmoor National Park, because they felt that the exceptional character of the moor as a national heritage and the need to balance and safeguard the various interests concerned called for special and immediate study.

My right honourable friends are greatly indebted to Lord Porchester for the fair and expeditious way in which he has conducted the Survey and prepared his report. This was published yesterday and copies are available in the Printed Paper Office.

The report establishes that since 1947 the total area of moorland in the National Park has been reduced by some 12,000 acres. Within the Critical Amenity Area

countries. She has extended and expanded in the best possible way our whole approach to aid, and I should like it made absolutely clear that that is what we meant.

I should like to give the noble Lord another quotation from his article. He said that in this particular project the Government's case was based on "less elevated political motives". In answer to this I should like to give one quotation from a recent article of my right honourable friend. It is this:

"... we all need to take into account human rights, whether it be Cambodia or Uganda, Indonesia, Chile, or Bolivia, Czechoslovakia or the Soviet Union".

As I have said, our offer of assistance has been welcomed, and our commitment to help when we can find the right projects is a firm one. The Government's reasons for deciding against the mining projects are good ones. They are perfectly well understood by the Bolivian Government, and we look forward to mutually satisfactory relations over new projects.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

The Earl of CLANCARTY asked Her Majesty's Government:

Whether they are aware that in France, since 1st September 1977, a section for the study of unidentified flying objects has been set up in the National Centre for Space Studies in Toulouse, under the direction of Monsieur Claude Poher, a distinguished scientist, and that this body is sponsored upon the French Ministry of Industry and Research; and whether there is a similar scientific organisation under Government sponsorship in the United Kingdom to study unidentified flying

objects, working closely with the French one.

The MINISTER of STATE, DEPARTMENT of EDUCATION and SCIENCE (Lord Donaldson of Kingsbridge): Her Majesty's Government understand that a study group called the Groupe d'Etudes sur les Phenomenes Aérospatiales Non-Identifiés (GEPAN) has been set up under the French Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Artisans at the National Centre for Space Studies in Toulouse. The group has no formal links with the United Kingdom, and we have no similar scientific group to study unidentified objects or phenomena.

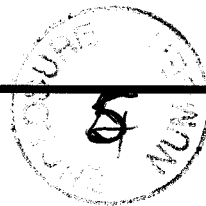
LEGAL AID REFUSALS

Thanks for the fax attaching Dr Clarke's latest letter. Our initial investigations have turned up papers on the Head of DI 54's response to CDS, but no copy of the original letter from the clergyman. I will let you have copies.

Incidentally, the file also contains a wealth of UFO correspondence from 1972 to 1996 (including S4(Air), DS8 and Sec(AS) minutes which might be of interest to you. Some enclosures are classified, so we cannot release the whole file, but I am happy to show it to you for you to mark up any correspondence you may wish to have copies of.

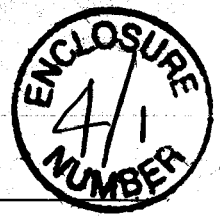

would it be seen flying low over the coast near Haverfordwest, because the debris didn't come down anywhere near Britain; neither can a piece of even the smallest space debris hover – it falls with the speed dictated by gravity.

I took an unprecedented step and ordered a number of radar tapes to be impounded and sent to me. As these tapes are usually wiped for reuse, it was important to work fast. There were a few returns which fitted the times and locations when sightings were made and after several hours of scouring the standard VHS videos I could isolate and identify these. At first, the results were disappointing. The blips faded in and out all night, like ghosts in the morning light. RAF radar experts explained these conventionally enough. Ground clutter, they said, tall trees picked up now and again around one particular radar head. But the frustration turned to fear: there were too many visual sightings, and the reports were from witnesses too trustworthy to ignore. Whatever it was that zigzagged Britain on 30 and 31 March 1993, that probed our fields and raced our cars, it was not picked up by radar. And consequently, with no radar track to set the procedure in motion, we hadn't even got our aircraft into the air. Was this the same triangle that had been seen over Belgium three years earlier? And could it now evade radar altogether?

Over the coming weeks I tried to find an explanation, but every avenue led nowhere. Whatever it was had come and gone. It was time to take the whole problem 'upstairs'. Frankly, I didn't hold out much hope that my bosses would listen. As I have said, my hands-on approach and my firm views that we were facing in UFOs a genuine phenomenon that needed serious and urgent research had not met with popularity in Secretariat (Air Staff). Subtlety was the key word, I felt. I drew up a carefully constructed report of the 30–31 March sightings and sent it to my head of division. I deliberately avoided the emotive word 'UFO',

inspirer of prejudices, and opted instead for 'uncorrelated target' and 'unknown craft'. Government bureaucracies are sometimes accused of inventing jargon for the sake of it, but here I felt it was necessary, it paid off. The report was passed up the chain of command until it reached the assistant chief of the air staff himself.

Simultaneously, I contacted the American embassy and asked them whether an unusual prototype aircraft of American construction was operating over Britain and might explain the various sightings. There had been rumours for months in the corridors of power that an aircraft called Aurora, which would make the Stealth bomber look like a Sopwith Pup, was in production. There had been consistent denials everywhere, however. A high-tech, radar-evading craft capable of great speeds and manoeuvrability, the sort of machine Clint Eastwood flies in *Firefox*, belonged to fiction. Aurora, we were told, did not exist. The Americans were as nonplussed as we and the Belgians were by the sightings.

The assistant chief of the air staff noted my report – there was little else he could do. By now I had tried all possible lines of inquiry. There were no other avenues left.

So the official findings (mine) read: 'Type of craft – unknown; origin of craft – unknown; motive of occupants – unknown.' And, although it appears nowhere in the official documentation, I would have to add: 'Conclusion – unsatisfactory.'

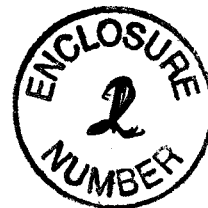
The 30–31 March sightings brought about a marked change in my own attitude. I would play no further part in bland platitudes about UFOs being 'of no defence significance'. I sensed that some of my colleagues thought UFOs were only of defence significance if they aimed laser beams at cities. But any craft, conventional or otherwise, that can do what that triangle did is of *extreme* defence significance in itself. Our radar couldn't trace it, our jets wouldn't be able to catch it. We can all thank our God – or our lucky stars

– that whatever it was it was anyway, hostile.

Thank you for your letter of 9 December enclosing the copies of UFO related documents I had requested under the Code of Practice.

Having had the opportunity to examine the material in depth during the holidays, I wish to thank you and your colleagues for the thorough and highly efficient manner in which you have handled this application.

As requested I enclose a crossed cheque for the £260 cost of processing, made out to the Accounting Officer MoD. I would be grateful if you could supply me with a receipt, which is required for my research project accounts. I have a number of matters arising from an examination of the material which I will address point by point:

1. I note with reference to file **D/DS8/75/3 Part A (Parliamentary Correspondence file, House of Lords debate, 1977-79)**, that several background documents generated by another Government department relating to the debate are being examined for possible release. If they are cleared for release, I would certainly wish to receive copies of these outstanding papers.
2. With reference to the enclosure 'To the Head of S4' dated 2 March 1978 included in the **Parliamentary Correspondence file** (highlighted copy enclosed): I draw your attention to the line which reads "...head of DI 54 consulted us at around the same time because he had been asked to draft a reply for CDS to send to a clergyman enquiring about UFOs. I took the opportunity to confirm our procedures on this subject - he has confirmed that we need do no more than look for defence implications. The key papers are Encl 71 and 78 on file S4/4/8/1 - Flags Y and Z." As far as I can recall this is the first time during my research that I have seen a reference to the Chief of Defence Staff being consulted with regards to policy on

UFOs. This leads me to ask: does file 'S4/4/8/1' exist in your archive, and if so can copies of the relevant file, particularly 'Enclosures 71 and 78', be supplied?

3. With reference to **File D/Sec(AS)12/7, UFO Report 31 March 1993**. Thank you for enclosing the loose minute showing inquiries made and details of the radar replay relevant to the investigation. You may be aware that the incumbent at Sec(AS)2a during 1993, Nick Pope, refers to his investigations into these reports in his book published in 1996, *Open Skies Closed Minds*. In the book (pg 140) he refers to the report he compiled that was sent to the head of his division, a copy of which you enclosed (dated 16 April 1993). Mr Pope states this report was "passed up the chain of command until it reached the assistant chief of the air staff himself" (presumably Air Marshal Sir Timothy Garden). However, there is no evidence in the file you released to suggested ACAS saw or commented on Mr Pope's report. Could you confirm that is the case?

4. With reference to **File D/Sec(AS)64/2 Part D, re UFO sightings, early hours of 5 October 1996**. I'm grateful that you enclosed the loose minute which responds to press reports criticising UK air defence systems arising from these events. My background research suggests the source of these criticisms was the late Martin Redmond MP, who asked a series of PQs on related matters in 1996. The LM dated 13 November 1996 you enclosed responds to "Mr Redmond's letter" but it is difficult to follow the responses without reference to the letter itself. Is a copy of Redmond's original letter enclosed in the file, and if so could a copy be supplied?

Finally, thank you for your detailed response to my questions on the impact of the FOIA upon the '30 year rule.' However, I remain unsure as to how the new act would work in practical terms. If in January 2005 I was to apply, for example, for access to the MoD's UFO records for the year 1981, how would my request be processed? Would the present procedure whereby pages are checked, sanitised and a charge made, continue? If that is the case, such requests might have to be rejected because of cost or staff time, which seems to defeat the objectives of the FOIA.

It seems to me that the single remaining problem with the release of UFO records younger than 30 years relate to the issue of personal information, ie informants names and addresses, rather than because of any security issues. Does the MoD have any suggestions as to how this problem could be overcome after 2005?
